were farmers, living in different parts of the No. Dist. county, and all respectable taxpayers, some of them paying large sums, their report should cause some action in the matter. However it is but a repetition of the reports made by the different grand juries for the past eight years. At risk of being charged with wearing out an old story we republish that part of the report that refers to the county buildings. It is as follows:

We have also examined the public iail. We report that the same is in-

public jail. We report that the same is in-secure and is altogether unfit for the pur-pose for which it is used.

The public court house we believe is no longer adequate to the requirements of the people of this county. The vault in which the public records are kept is unsafe. It would not withstand a fire, and there is con-stant danger of irreparable loss from this source. This vault is also too small to contain the public records, as are also the diffe ent rooms in the building not sufficiently large to accommodate the officers and juries who have to transact business therein.

The Oklahoma Incursion.

A dispatch from Purcell, Indian Territory, April 22nd, says: A grand rush was made at noon to-day across the Oklahoma line. Fast horses were in demand, some selling as high as \$500 to parties who expect to make fast time and select choice claims. All the morning boomers were completing preparations, and those who determined to go by train crowded on board the cars of the Kansas Southern railroad, and when the pas-enger cars were filled, they gladly got on flat and freight cars which the railroad officials brought to accommodate the overflow. Men brought their horses to the banks of the Canadian river, and had boats ready to take them across as soon as 12 o'clock struck. Men waited with watches in hand for the ap-pointed hour, and when the clock struck guns were fired and whistles blown, and im-mediately trains started across the bridge and

horsemen embarked for the opposite shore.

Another dispatch says: 'The day was coudless and far away was seen, both to the east and to the west, clouds ascending from the hoofs of hundreds of horses, rushing toward different destinations in most cases, but some of them toward the same one. One race for the same goal could be easily dis-tinguished. The riders were apparently evenly mounted, and ren neck and neck for a mile or so along the track, as far as they could be seen, and their eager and intense looks and the merciless slashing of their horses was sufficient evidence of the prize they were running after.

One saddled but riderless horse was seen

One saddled but rideriess horse was a galloping along the trail, an eminous sign of some accident or fatality which had befallen the rider. Some went in charge of horses and were evidently riding relays.

Out of the dust which arose towards the east could be seen, after the train had east could be seen, after the train had reached the summit of a high ridge, a wagon caravan fully two miles in length, and which was being sped to the utmost speed of its horses. The caravans were plainly cutdistanced by the horseback riders, and after several miles of territory had been traversed it was seen that the best riders were winning the heat prizes. the best prizes.

Fifteen thousand home-seekers are camped on the grassy uplands of Guthrie, the pioneer city of Oklahoma. Their camp fires gleam in the darkness, and their tents loom athwart the sky like an army in bivouac. Guthrie, heretofore an insignificant station in a wild and uninhabited country, remote from civili-zation, has a population of more than 15, 000. All this was gained in one afternoon. In no country, save America, and in no part of the country, save the great West, could such a thing be possible.

Game Law in Crook County.

PRINEVILLE, OR., April 8, 1889. Entror Guano.—Seeing in the Guano of March 9th a copy of the game laws as relating to deer, I will show your readers how unjust it is to Eastern Oregon people, especially in Crook county. One can not kill deer from November 1st to July 1st. There are no deer in Crook county from November 1st to July 1st. They go to the Blue mountains in April and May and do not return until driven out in winter by the snow, so you see that Crook county people can not eat venison without violating the laws of Oregon. We want to be law abiding citizens, but when such laws are forced upon us to our detriment, what will we do for meat that we have a perfect right to eat. Entron Guann .- Seeing in the Guann of us to our detriment, what will we do for meat that we have a perfect right to eat. Many families depend on wild meat through the winter season. This law is a favor to the Warm Spring Indians as they can go to the mountains at any time to burn, baving to the mountains at any time to hunt, having no crops to harvest. I would like to know who this law was passed in favor of. I have been on the frontier all my life, and it seems that it is a very unjust law. Crook county was ably represented in the legislature, but I do not know how our representatives voted out his bill. We would not ask the governor to call at extra assains, to repeal this law. to call an extra session to repeal this law, but ask its members to frame game laws ar nearly as possible to represent all parts of the state, especially those that are on the frontiers struggling for a hold, and have not the chance of the inland counties that have ccess to railroad transportation and smoke houses full of bacon.

The Land Law.
