



Our Oregon Letter.

We take the following letter from the Cedar Ealls, Iowa, Gezette, of May 3rd. ft appeared in twenty-five Iowa journals at the same time. The writer of the communication is Prof. W. N. Hull, of the State Agri.

cultural College at Corvallis: Convallis, Or., April 25th, 1889. Winter merged into Spring so unconsciously that they could not be distinguished or separated. It never troze so as to cut the grass and pasturage was good all winter-Gardening generally began about the middle of February. Fruit blooming was exceedingly luxuriant. The trees seemed to act as though they understood their business, and as there are no accidents in the weather nor as there are no accidents in the weather nor climatic changes to destroy it, fruit is always sure; pears, apples, a great variety of plums, cherries, etc. The middle of April cherries are as large as peas, and seemingly as thick as they could hang. Mr. Higgins, a clerk in a grocery store, in his leisure hours has planted five acres of plums or prunes, and this third year of the trees he stripped off all the blossoms, not permitting them to bear until they were four years old. I shall now give your readers some positive and indisputable evidence on fruit raising. In an interview with Mr. S. P. Sladden, of Eugene, some facts were gleamed, and in answer to my letter of inquiry, the following is a portion of his reply. I may say that Mr. Sladden is well known to many

say that Mr. Sladden is well known to many in Cedar Falls as an old soldier. He took a silver medal for best dried fruits at the California Fruit Growers Association last year.

"Poor health—very poor—brought me out here from the East. It was my intention to buy a small place near a pleasant town, plant an orchard and endeavor to regain my health an orchard and endeavor to regain my health working among my little trees. Four years ago last fall I came with my family to Oregon, and I bought three or four pieces of land adjoining Eugene City. The first fall and winter I cleared some fifty acres and planted fruit trees. The two succeeding years I planted more trees and now have eighty acres in fruit. Many of the trees I set out the first year will have 100 to 125 lbs of green fruit to a tree this year. In the

eighty acres in fruit. Many of the trees I set out the first year will have 100 to 125 lbs of green fruit to a tree this year. In the case of Silver prunes I shall have 40 to 48 lbs of dried fruit to a tree. These dried prunes last year weighed sixteen to the pound (I inclose one). I had a fine lot on the same trees last year—about two tons of dried prunes. I sold all of them to dealers to go to California. I sold none less than 2 to 12½ cents per pound, and could have sold any amount of them if I had dried them. I weighed the green fruit on a few of the old trees that were on the place when I bought it, and found that I had 700 to 800 lbs of green fruit, giving an average of 200 lbs of dried fruit with seeds in. Now had my 2400 prune trees been full grown with such a crop, it would have stood as follows: 135 trees to an acre, 127 of which say are full bearers, 200 lbs to a tree at 12c per lb would give \$24 to tree or \$2,800 per acre. This may even be cut down one-half and it is a good showing. (Corvallis friends think it a low estimate as it is given.) Even my yong trees will fully austain these figures. As I said I have planted 80 acres, about as follows: 2,400 prunes, 2,500 pears, 1,500 apples, 1,500 peach, quince, apricot, nectarine, plum and cherry. I have aimed to plant commercial fruit, in other words, fruit for selling green or for drying. I have just built a dryer of ten tons dail; capacity. While the trees are young we grow large quantities of carrots and other vogetables which sell in our city store. I have entirely regained my health, weighing 222 lbs, whereas I weighed but 150 lbs when I came here. which sell in our city store.
