## The Niagara Canal.

There is no enterprise projected within the state of Oregon that is of half the importance to our interests than a ship canal would prove across Central America or the Isthmus of Panama.

It would raise the price of our wheat crop at least \$2,000,000.

It would raise the price of every head of stock in Oregon.

A great lumbering industry would spring up that in five years would ship a cargo of lumber to the Eastern states and Europe every day in the year.

Portland and Tacoma Bay would be only twenty days distant from New York, and the cheapness of water communication would give Oregon about the same price and market as Indiana has. This would be a steady market at advanced prices.

All this De Lesseps canal meant. From the day of its inception it was steadily opposed by Republicans, the newspapers on the Pacific Coast. In a great measure the Republican party prevented its completion. Such a course is only equalled in folly by the laws which swept the American merchant marine from the ocean, and transferred the greatest shipbuilding yards in the world from the coast of Maine to the banks of the Clyde in Scotland.

Since the De Lesseps canal has failed the Nicaragua canal comes to the front again. It has an unrivaled set of calculators in its employ. It is to cost only \$80,000,000. But before the work is done it will cost ten times that amount. The U. S. Government should spend the surplus on the canal, and make it free when completed.

The Farmers' Review of Chicago will publish in its issue this week a careful estimate as to the yield of wheat. In the winter wheat states, with the exception of Kentucky and Indiana, where drought was experienced in April and May, winter wheat has arrived at the harvesting stage in good condition and with good prospect of a large percentage of "No. 1 hard." There is little change in the acreage, except in Kansas, where there is an increase of about 25 per cent, and in Missouri and Illinois, where there has been a considerable falling off in the area devoted to winter wheat. The average yield per acre is: Illinois, 15 bushels; Michigan, 16; Kentucky 16.8; Kansas 20; Indiana 18; Ohio 14; Missouri 12. The acreage is: Illinois 2,560,640; Indiana 2,744,000; Ohio 3,655,227; Kentucky 1,003,928; Missouri 1,402,626; Kansas 1,312,500; Michigan 1,612,847.

While Corporal Tanner is making the Treasury suffer he does not forget his own household. He draws a salary of \$5,000 and a pension of \$804 a year. His daughter, who acts as his private secretary, receives \$1,800 and a younger daughter has a clerkship which pays her \$20 a year. The Corporal also has a son who receives a snug salary as a Government employee.

Eastern financiers are becoming scared at the continued drain of gold to Europe, over \$30,000,000 having gone there from the United States within two months. With the surplus \$75,000,000 withdrawn annually from business in addition to this it is time they should begin to grow uneasy.

## Council Proceedings.

COUNCIL CHAMBER, July 8, 1889.

Full board present. The committee on streets reported that the street adjacent to D. Cherry's property, on Pearl street, had sunk and that drain is imperfect. Recommended that grade be lowered and the drain made to conduct the water into the ditch; also that the grade on same street along the Kinney and Park property does not appear to have been made as contemplated. Also recommended that the same be repaired and in each of the cases be paid for out of general fund. Report approved.

Bills ordered paid: Eugene Water Co., \$67.75; S. A. Ogden, \$4; Miss Minnie Spores, \$4.20; Journal, \$5; C. M. Collier, \$5.75; McClung & Johnson, \$3; B. F. Dorris, \$44.35.

Printing committee reported that the newspapers would charge \$1 per square for first insertion and 50 cents for each subsequent insertion, for any length of time. It was ordered that the bill to be filed up to be used for the Oregon Home Team apparatus.

Committee reported that hydrants had been placed at the corner of Oak and Ninth streets, and on Olive at Seventh, Eighth and Ninth streets and moved by them.

Receipt for 1000 feet of hose. Committee instructed to send bill to San Francisco.

Warrant ordered drawn in favor of W. H. Abrams for \$385 for building bell tower.

Quarterly reports of Treasurer and Recorder read and filed.

Bills referred: Electric Light Co., one month's service, \$80; Electric Light Co., for removal, \$22.50; Chas. Hollenbeck, \$1; G. N. Fraser, \$5.75; Robt. Patterson, 75 cents; U. N. Mfg. Co., \$48.02; Dr. D. A. Paine, \$4.50; S. A. Ogden, \$2.50; W. J. McGee, \$7; Cal. Fire App. Mfg. Co., \$28.84; J. T. Rowland, \$31; Eugene Water Co., \$28.

Rule suspended and warrant ordered drawn in favor of the Eugene Water Co. for \$186, balance of bill referred to finance committee.

Sidewalks ordered constructed in 30 days: On east side of Willamette street from alley between 6th and 7th streets to south line of depot grounds, and the same sidewalk, ten feet in width. On north side of Eighth from the intersection of the county road, west to city limits; the same to be 6 feet in width. Also on east side of Willamette street from the corner of Eleventh street north to the south line of Geo. B. Dorris' property, the same to be eight feet in width. Also the corner of Eleventh and Willamette east 150 feet on north side 11th street. On south side Eleventh from Oak to east side of Robt. Pratt's property, walk to be 6 feet wide; east side of Willamette along the property of Mrs. Bramley, Mrs. Brauman and Mrs. Fitch, the same sidewalk.

Ordinance No. 76, providing for the construction of sidewalks, passed.

Ordinance No. 77, regulating slaughter houses, passed.

On motion of Mr. Roney the city attorney was instructed to draft an ordinance requiring the Water Co. to establish a pump station above the mouth of the slough.

Ordinance No. 78, to prohibit the sale of feeding of cattle and hogs within the corporate limits of the city, passed.

Ordinance No. 79, establishing fire limits, passed.

Chief engineer ordered to examine and have placed in repair all stove pipes.

The street commissioner was instructed to order all persons to destroy all stables, garages or adjacent to their property.

Petitions for hydrants on 13th street at Willamette and Oak. Read and referred to committee on water works.

A petition from the Water Co. asking for an ordinance to prohibit slaughter houses in city limits. Read and filed. Adjourned to 9th inst.

July 9, 1889. Mr. McClung, from the street committee, reported the survey of Washington street completed. The committee was authorized to advertise for bids for grading and graveling said street.

Rules suspended and bills ordered paid: James Meade, \$2.50; F. A. Brown, \$2.50; Geo. Croner, \$5; J. M. Danahy, \$4; Geo. Fanning, \$4; J. T. Rowland, \$4. Adjourned.
