After all that was said by the Republican platform, by Mr. Harrison in his campaign speeches and letter of acceptance and by all the organs and speakers of the party against the "pet banks," and the policy of so disposing of the surplus revenues, it is surprising to learn from the July debt statement that the Government deposits in the pet banks were increased during the month from \$17,423,337 to \$48,930,764 or by about \$31,500,000.

To be sure it is a relic of barbarism, but it is our way."

Gilmore replied that he would not give \$250 for the whole contract, and refused to go; so Abbey drove away, signed the papers and brought young Hoffman to America. Less than a year later Abbey made contracts whereby Josef was to perform in the Academy of Music, and Abbey was to receive 50 per cent of the gross receipts. "I suppose I was an idiot," concluded Gilmore, sadly.

A cat in Mississippi recently gave up its life to save the community. The river was very high, and the dyke which had been built to keep out the water gave way in one place and the water was pouring in, and realizing the condition of affairs, crawled into the hole and stopped the flood. It is estimated that \$80,000 and a number of lives were saved by the heroic feline, and the villagers have built a beautiful tomb of red granite, with nice carved in relief, over the bones of the animal.—Newport Republican.

A peculiar condition of the South Fork of the Santiam now exists, as it does every autumn. On the upper river are extensive chalk banks, which during the excessive dry weather crumble down into the river, giving it a milky whiteness. This is so marked that newcomers on first beholding the sight wonder indeed if they have found the country "where milk and honey flow." This condition of the river is not due to fishing, as no fish can be found in the stream until its runs clear again later in the fall.

The Behring sea outlet into the Pacific is 120 miles across from the nearest Russian island to the nearest Alaskan island. This is not a single authority on international law, American or foreign, that justifies the claim that it is a closed sea. Webster, Clay, Adams and every American secretary of state, proclaimed it an open sea. Three miles from land the jurisdiction of the Alaska fur seal monopoly goes, and no further.

The hotels and private residences are all pretty well filled with visitors.

The instrument has 125 sounding stops and possesses the extraordinary novelty of a pedal rest step of sixty-four sounding lengths. The wind supply is maintained by a gas engine of great power.

The largest amount of money ever paid out for one telegraph message in the history of the Pacific coast, was that of Schwabacker Bros., the day after the Seattle fire. It amounted to \$600 and was an order for goods.

Pick Up the Land.

It is reported by those who think they know whereof they speak, that the timber and pre-emption acts will be repealed at the next session of Congress, says the Baker City Democrat. Whether or not these prophecies are correct we cannot say but certain it is that nearly everybody believes them and all who have the ready money are striving for and investing in tall timber. If Congress should repeal this act all timber land would be worth at this time per acre in less than a year, in choice location more than double that sum. Those who have not yet exercised their rights should make haste to secure 100 acres or more of Uncle Sam's property before the same is withdrawn from the market.

Homeless at Canyonville.

Thursday, August 9th, about 4 p. m., two men, J. S. Catching and L. Fickett, residents of Canyonville, got into a quarrel about some lumber. Words ensued, when Catching called Fickett a liar, whereupon Fickett picked up a short piece of scantling, which had a bolt in one end, and struck Catching over the temple, stunning him, breaking his skull. Catching made an effort to run to his feet, when Fickett again struck him over the ear, the bolt penetrating the brain. Medical aid was summoned. Dr. Devore pronounced the wound fatal. Catching remained unconscious through the night, and died about 7 o'clock Friday morning. Fickett fled, heavily armed, and has not been arrested.
