A correspondent in Pennsylvania sends us one of the Republican campaign cards of 1888, which he took the precaution to save. It contains these injunctions:

WORKMEN!

Protect your homes! Free trade reduces wages! Free trade will close American factories. Free trade serves the interests of Europe.

Protection insures fair wages and regular employment. Protection serves the interests of this country.

These are the issues. These assurances will be recalled with a decided disposition to "kick themselves" by many voters who were deceived by them. "Four years more" of high protection were hardly insured before wages in the protected industries began to fall and mills and manufacturing to close.

What do the co-erced employees of Andrew Carnegie think of the "fair wages" insured by protection? What do the cotton mill operatives in Fall River, forced to accept a reduction in wages and denied even an interview with the mill owners, think of it? What do the coal-miners of Illinois think of the "fair wages and regular employment" insured by the triumph of protection? How do the glass-workers square their reduction of pay with the "take effect to-day, with these anti-election promises?"

Object-lessons like these are a great help in the campaign of education.

It Sounds Democratic.

Hon James E. Campbell, in accepting the Democratic nomination for Governor of Ohio spoke on the tariff question a few words that show where he stands on the tariff question: The first duty which confronts us is to discuss and educate the people upon the reform of the tariff. We are accustomed to boast that our country excels the world in natural resources; in agricultural and mineral wealth, and in advantageous location. We rejoice in a vast area of unoccupied lands which offer cheap homes to all. We claim to be the freest and most intelligent, inventive, industrious and enterprising people on earth. To these combined causes we truthfully ascribe our phenomenal increase in prosperity, wealth and greatness: We do not accept the dogmas that these glorious results are due to an exorbitant tariff, or that the custom house has been the predominant factor in national growth.

We publish the following from the New York World for the benefit of those organs that are always declaring that elections are being carried in the South by force and fraud: "Representative Peters, of Kansas, who had the fairness to stay and witness the election in the Third Louisiana District, instead of prejudicing it and coming away as one of the Republican visiting statesmen did, testifies in an interview at Washington to the entire peaceableness of the canvass and the election. He spoke several times and was everywhere treated with courtesy. "So far as outside appearances were concerned," he says, "the meetings are just like Northern Republican meetings." When the Republican Tariff Bill made a cut of 50 per cent in the protection to sugarcane growers the managers of course abandoned all hope of carrying Louisiana."

Quite Sensational.

ROBERTA FALLA, W. T. Sept. 16.—Exposures in the most disgraceful scandal in the history of Washington were made to-day. On account of the terrible fire that occurred August 4th, thousands of dollars worth of provisions were sent here from all parts of the country for the relief of the sufferers. The supplies were taken in charge of by the Relief Committee and issued in pursuance upon orders obtained from persons authorized to perform that duty. Subsequently it was discovered that crookedness had been practiced, and that Robert Ingalls, an employee of the relief committee who was suspected of stealing goods and selling them to grocers and others, had left the city. Chief of Police Warren traced him to Chicago, California, and brought him back. He then made the startling statement that a conspiracy had existed among the officials and others for the appropriation of the relief supplies on a large scale. Three Commissioners of the town have been arrested on the charge.

Secretary Noble, on a motion for a review made by the state of Oregon in the swamp land bill reviewed by Secretary Vias on December 27, 1888, has denied the motion. The new war ship, Baltimore, built by the Cramps, has made her first trip in rough sea 20 knots per hour. It is said that the navies of the whole world do not possess ten vessels that can attain this speed. So it will be seen that the United States has at last got a first-class vessel for her navy. It should not be forgotten that the vessel was built under the instructions of Wm. C. Whitney, Secretary of the Navy under President Cleveland.

According to the wheat estimates of the London Miller, Russia will fall 72,000,000 bushels below the average, Hungary 36,000,000, Roumania 8,000,000, India 18,000,000, and South America and Australia 24,000,000, which gives a total shortage of 166,000,000 bushels. The United States shows an increase of 82,000,000, Canada 8,000,000, England and France 32,000,000 and Italy, Spain, Belgium, Holland and Algeria 32,000,000, making a total of 154,000,000.

A Portland physician has carefully analyzed the Willamette river water used in that city, and pronounces it exceptionally pure. It contains only one half a grain of organic matter to the gallon, much less than the Croton water in New York, the lake water in Chicago or that used in almost any city. According to his statement the people of Portland are not so very much in need of Bull Run water after all.—E. O.

Theo L. Stiles, candidate on the Washington Republican ticket for Supreme Judge, has been indicted six times by a Tucson, A. T., grand jury for embezzlement as assignee of Hudson & Son, bankers. If the charges are true, as related by the dispatch, the penitentiary would be a more fit place for him than a Judge of the Supreme Court.

A writer in Scribner's states, as a result of careful study of railroad statistics, that a man might travel 51,000,000 miles before being killed. When a person has traveled \$50,000,000 miles it would be a very good time to stop.

Judge Terris A. Groff has been appointed commissioner of the general land office. He was elected to the office of judge, which he is now holding, on a non-partisan ticket.

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Bob Younger, the youngest of the notorious robbers bearing that name, died in the Minnesota penitentiary on Sept. 16th.

The New Jersey Republicans have nominated Gen. E. B. Grubb for Governor. The Iowa Democrats have nominated Horace Boies for Governor.

Union Party.

Fifty-nine delegates, representing the Prohibitionists, Gangers and K's of L. met in Salem Saturday and organized under the above name. Dr. J. F. Hendrix was chosen Chairman and S. M. Miller, Secretary of the State Central Committee. Following is the substance of their declaration of principles:

Alarmed by the aggressiveness of giant trusts, monopolies and the liquor traffic, working for the pauperization and degradation of the producing masses, they propose to have all class legislation in the interest of capitalists repealed; that the government should prohibit the liquor traffic; should issue money in necessary quantity without intervention of banks; should regulate corporations and prevent unjust exactions and discriminations; should restore to the public domain all streams of land grants, to be reserved for actual settlers, prevent encroachments from holding land and aliens from acquiring it; should require ten years residence and a knowledge of our institutions as conditions of citizenship, and provide that citizenship, character and intelligence should be the qualifications of voters; should declare trusts, combinations and trusts, through accordingly; should provide for arbitration to prevent strikes, protect employees, provide equal pay for equal work for both sexes and foster labor, agricultural and co-operative associations; and should not permit the issuance of non-taxable bonds.
