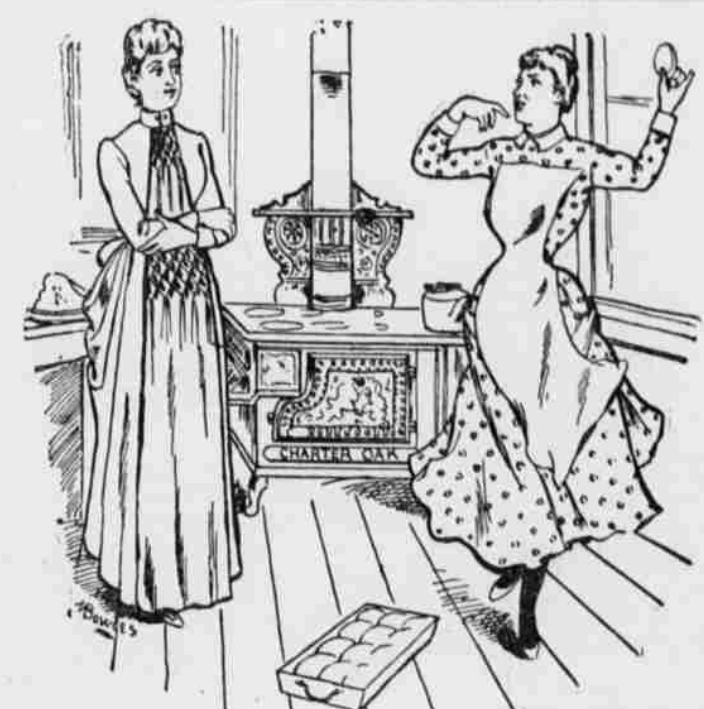

Unsurveyed Lands.

The following is an extract from a letter
of the Surveyor General to one of his cor-
respondents, making inquiries as to the
mode of procedure in asking for a survey of
public lands:
The appropriation made by congress for
public surveys for the current fiscal year
(which commenced on September 1,) was
\$200,000. This under the law and regula-
tions, must be expended for townships oc-
cupied, in whole or part, by actual settlers
with improvements; and the surveys shall
be confined to lands adapted to agriculture
and line of reservations.

In order to secure surveys, the department
requirement is that application thereto should
be addressed to this office.

The settlers living upon the unsurveyed
lands in the vicinity should unite in a
petition which should be accompanied by a
statement showing the number of bonafide
settlers, the character of the unsurveyed
lands, the nature and value of the improve-
ments, and the area under cultivation stating,
if possible, the township. The approximate
general course of such valleys should also
be noted.

For several years past it has been the
policy of the General Land office to prohibit
the survey of her forests or heavily timbered
lands; but it may be necessary under the re-
quirements of the Approximate Act (Second
Session Act, Fiftieth Congress, chapter 114,
page 959) to make some modification of this
restriction. There are in some localities fine
agricultural lands which although heavily
timbered, are occupied in part by actual set-
tlers, who at great loss and expense have
made for themselves permanent homes to
which they are anxious to make title.

Whenever such cases arise, all the facts as to
the character of the lands, and the kind and
quality of the timber, in addition to the in-
formation as to the number of settlers and
the character of their improvements, should
be fully presented for the consideration of
this office and the general land office.

The Hon. Commissioner will allow the
awarding of contracts for the survey of tim-
ber lands when their value for agricultural
purposes is well established, and satisfactory
proof is given of their occupation by bonafide
settlers who have made permanent im-
provements.

Upon receipt of the petition I will forward
the same to the general land office with an
estimate of the cost of the desired surveys
and such recommendations as this office
may deem proper.

In the event of the survey being ordered
by the Hon. Commissioner, the expense
thereof will be paid by the government.

Suffered the Penalty.

ESPERO CITY, Or., Dec. 14.—John Gilman,
murderer of Mrs. Etionover and her child,
was hanged yesterday in the jail yard. He
mounted the scaffold at 1 o'clock with a firm
step, murmured a few indistinct words and
bade the crowd farewell. Death was instan-
taneous.

Gilman leased land to Etionover. The
two quarreled and Gilman wanted his ten-
ant to vacate, but the latter refused to go
until the expiration of his lease. One day
when Etionover was away at work Gilman
killed Mrs. Etionover and her little child
and dug a grave for the husband. When
the latter came home and called for his wife
to come and see him across a river which
separated the two families' residences, he
did not respond, but Gilman appeared and
offered to take him over in his (Gilman's)
boat. He had a club in the boat with which
he had planned to kill the man, but failed to
attack him until he got across. Then a
struggle occurred, the noise of which at-
tracted the neighbors. Etionover was
badly used up but recovered. Search for
the missing wife and child resulted in the
discovery of their remains and the open
grave that awaited their husband and father.
Then Gilman confessed. The object of the
crime was to regain possession of the leased
land without waiting for the lease to expire.
Full particulars of the crime was published
in the GUARD some time ago.

In the sixteen cases brought by the farm-
ers of Polk county against the Southern Pa-
cific railroad company for negligently allow-
ing sparks to escape from its locomotives
and set on fire and destroy their property
last July, judgments were rendered at the
present term of the circuit court at Dallas
against the company and in favor of the
farmers, in all to the aggregate amount of
\$12,840 65. After the fire the company
offered, as a compromise, to pay the farmers
in full of the damages sustained, \$5,307 50,
which the farmers refused to accept and
brought suits on their respective claims with
the above results of over seven thousand
dollars more than the company offered to
pay for the damages on account of the fire.

selected houses, and the two year man an
