Five Million Seals.

A Washington dispatch says: Henry W. Elliott, of the Smithsonian Institute, who made the last census of Alaska and whom Professor Baird sent to investigate the seal rookeries, says: Secretary Windom is right in his determination to reduce the annual catch in Behring sea, as the seals are decreasing. He places the number of seals in Alaskan waters at 5,000,000. Of these 3,200,000 are breeding seals and young, one-half being pups and a million and a half young males and yearling females. Excluding pups, Elliott says there are only a little over 3,000,000 adults. He denies the assertion of Senator Plinn that the Alaska Commercial Company is the only capable bidder, and says there are five or six organizations that can compete if given time for preparation.

Rev. J. R. Kirkpatrick, of Lebanon, has returned from Seattle, where the Albany Democrat, he raised \$8,000 towards a \$10,000 church, to be built in Seattle this year, and would have gotten the entire amount but for an attack of the grippe. The church is to be for the Cumberland Presbyterians, and will be modern in improvements. Rev. Kirkpatrick is a rustler and makes everything he attacks count.

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A letter from D. D. Prettyman, who is now located at Huselmine, Wash., gives a slight contrast between the Willamette valley and the Big Bend country of Washington. He says: "Snow began to fall here on the 1st, and continued to fall until there is now 18 inches of solid snow on the ground, and it is badly drifted in places. The mercury was down to 14 below zero on the 1st. Just think of it, here we are snowed in, the stock starving for food, the wind blow some of the time cold enough to freeze the head off a man; 'this does will do me.' Just 42 years ago on the 17 inst., I landed in Oregon City and found shales." He says further "The trains have been blockaded on the Central Washington railroad, running through here, and I have not heard on running or heard a whistle for over a week. Just ponder over it and pity us out here in the Big Bend."


It is reported that Judge L. F. Mosher, of Roseburg, is lying dangerously ill at his home in that city, with little or no hopes of his recovery. The Judge is engaged on a literary work, "The History of Oregon," that will be an invaluable work. Mr. Mosher is a graduate from West Point, a Mexican war veteran, and passed through nearly all the Indian wars in Oregon while yet in the service. It is to be hoped that he may be spared and the history completed.

Mercury: If the position taken by young Webster, of Jackson county, should obtain in this country, the czar of all the Russias possesses but little more authority than a judge. If Editor Kaiser libeled Mr. Webster, why did he not proceed against the newspaper man in the regular way? This he had both an equitable and legal right to do, and the press would have upheld him in that position. But for him to appear as prosecutor, judge and jury, places him in a position that both the press and public will condemn. If his case is properly attended to, the probability is that Webster will soon be retired to private life.

Portland Mercury, Rep: A mortgage for \$2,500, given to President Harrison, was filed for record on Wednesday. The numerous business failures in Tacoma the past week, wicked Democrats will say, are now accounted for. They will claim that it is the ill-luck brought to the town by the present administration.

On a ranch near Sumner, Wash., says the Herald, there are thirty-five acres of hops which are sold on contract for the next two years at a price that will amount to \$500 per acre, a net profit of \$450 per acre. Ten acres of this farm are now being set to small fruits, and on account of the adaptability of the soil to grow them to perfection, it is not too much to say that each acre set to fruits will yield a net profit of \$600 annually.

At the next session of the legislature a bill should be passed establishing some uniformity in the platting of city additions. At the last session a measure was passed applying to Portland, requiring all plats filed to be approved by the county surveyor, and to conform to the streets already laid out. A similar law is needed concerning other towns.
