FEATHERED FAVORITIES SUFFER. Jackson-ille Times, Feb. 27: The mortality among the quail and feathered sougsters of the ey during the long continued snow siege has been something fearful. Whole flocks of quail succumbed one by one to the rapacity of hawks and coyotes, or in some instances whole coveys died, huddled together under clump of fir or chapparral. Even when trequenting barnyards and granaries hun-dreds of birds have been found dead with their crops full of grain, their inability to seeme gravel or some other aids to diges-tion having feemingly proved destructive to life. In sections the mountain quali, mountain quail, which sometimes feed on fir buds, have weathered through, while the smaller valley quail are apparently almost extinct.

A New Power.—A correspondent of the Yaquina Republican writes: The vessel built within the past year at Siuslaw is to be propelled by a new motive power, which if it proves a saucess, will revolutionize occan navigation.
