Arrested After Ten Years.

Oregonian, March 2: J. W. Pool, aged about 29 years, was recently arrested in Idaho. He is charged with murder, and it is claimed that he committed the crime about ten years ago in Douglas county, Oregon. Pool was brought to this city in custody of William Edwards, deputy sheriff of Ada county, on his way to Roseburg. The prisoner on reaching this city, was taken to the county jail and locked up in the cage occupied by Chee Gon for a long time before his execution last summer, where a reporter saw him yesterday. Pool was perfectly willing to talk upon the subject of his alleged crime and arrest, and Jailor James kindly permitted him to undergo an interview in his private office.

The prisoner is not a bad looking man, and none would think that at the age of 19 he had already killed his man. He was atired in an ordinary suit, such as farm hands wear, and his blonde hair covered with a cowboy's hat, though there was nothing boyish in his manner. In reply to numerous questions which the reporter asked him, Pool said: "I was arrested a week ago to-day on Wm. Stewart's farm in Ada county, Idaho, where I had been at work, for shooting James McNeil, in self-defense, on the 10th of October, 1880. The facts of the case are these: On that day McNeil's son and I were in my father's house, on Elk creek, Douglas county, when the elder McNeil came in very angry, and talked roughly to his boy. He then began on me without any apparent cause. I talked back and he came at me with a hatchet, then with a knife, and at last threatened to shoot me with a gun he was carrying. I was so scared that I fled from the premises. I was absent six or seven hours, and returning to the house, McNeil was still there. In the meantime I had procured a revolver, meaning to use it if self-defense.

As I entered the house the old man spoke to me roughly and made a pass as if to reach for his gun, which was in a further part of the room. I said, "if you get your gun I'll shoot you." McNeil then went down to get his knife, angrily saying, "I'll kill you, you ---!" I wanted no trouble, but he kept coming at me, when I shot him in the leg. I had no intention of killing him, but merely wanted to disable him. However, he died from the effects of the shot.

Frightful Atrocities.

"So far as the natives are concerned, Alaska is a savage country," said a man who has lived in Alaska for years, to a reporter. "It was my fortune, on one occasion to witness a 'devil dance' of the natives. When the frenzy of the dancers was at its highest pitch the medicine man appeared and fastened his teeth in the naked back of a young woman. She and her child were torn limb from limb and eaten. The natives may be divided into cannibals or human flesh eaters, dog eaters and fish eaters.

Many of their ceremonies are frightful to contemplate. Whenever a new chief is elected he must be provided with a new house, and that house built in the following manner: The supporters of the chief dig the necessary material to the site and dig four holes in which the posts are planted, the throats of the four women are cut and their dead bodies are placed in the holes. Then the posts are put in and the construction of the house proceeds. In Alaska witchcraft is still punished with death. In one place I found a beautiful little girl with long flaxen hair, and asked the Indian nurse whose child she was. The nurse replied that the little one had been found on a barren island beside the dead body of her mother, who had been killed for witchcraft. Whenever a woman is suspected of consorting with the evil one she is taken to the medicine man. Her feet are tied together and the ligature is then attached to her hair, and her feet and head are thus drawn together until her tongue and eyes protrude. She is then cast on an island and left to starve.

Imported Seed Wheat.

A car load of Australian white wheat imported especially for seed has been received in Albany by the well known grain merchant, Mr. W. F. Crosby, and it will be distributed among the farmers. The cost of the wheat was considerable, \$1.80 per bushel, but it possesses superior qualities for both fall and spring sowing and will doubtless be sown by farmers.
