State Democratic Ticket.

A telegram to the GUARD Friday gives the ticket nominated at Portland Thursday as follows: Robert Miller, of Jackson county, for congress; Sylvester Penney, of Multnomah, for governor; W. M. Townsend, of Lake, for secretary of state; G. W. Webb, of Umatilla, for treasurer; B. F. Bonham, of Marion, for supreme judge; A. Le Roy, of Linn, for superintendent of public instruction; John O'Brien, of Lane, for state printer; T. G. Owens, of Coos, for prosecuting attorney of the second judicial district.

Oregon in 1844.

A copy of the Interior, published at Chicago, contains an article headed "Oregon in 1844 and 1859," which is full of interest and to those not familiar with the facts would astonish many. It shows that in Congress in 1844 Mr. Dayton, of New Jersey, made the following remarks about Oregon, and were he alive now to make them he would receive one of the severest castigations imaginable for lying about perhaps the most promising section of the United States: "With the exception of land along the Willamette and a few water courses, the whole country is among the most irremediable, barren waste of which we have read, except the desert of Sahara. Nor is this the worst; the climate is so unfavorable to human life that the natives have dwindled away under the malaria to a degree which defies all history to furnish a parallel. Of all the countries on the face of the earth it is the least favored by Heaven. It is the mere riddlings of creation. Russia has her Siberia, England her Botany Bay, and if the United States should ever need a country where to banish her rogues and scoundrels the utility of Oregon would be manifest. By water its distance is 18,000 miles, and by land 5,000. We are nearer the remote nations of Europe than to Oregon. Talk of steam communication. Who is to build a railroad across 2500 miles of prairie, of desert and of mountains, and who is to supply the means. The mines of Mexico and Peru disemboweled would hardly pay a penny in the pound of cost."

Other speakers were as severe. A London paper said, "the whole territory in dispute is not worth £30,000." The Edinburgh Review said, "the desert extends from the Mexican border to the Columbia." One Captain Sturgis said that "rather than to have new states beyond the Rockies the Union would be better off if Oregon would sink into the Symmes' hole." Even Thos. A. Benton said the god Terminus should be set on the Rockies. Senator McDuffy, of South Carolina, said he would not give a pinch of snuff for the whole territory. He thanked God for the merities of the Rockies. Then the writer said: "What would Dayton and Benton think if they could take a Pullman at Chicago to-day and visit the Oregon of 1889." Further, "The history of the Pacific slope since that debate in Congress of 1844 has been marvelous beyond any precedent in the annals of the race." Then he goes on to show "what the mere riddlings of creation" have become, and as we all know, it is not necessary to repeat it. Hear his peroration, for he is a Californian: "Let the readers of the Interior look toward the setting sun and realize what an empire is growing up there to be kissed daily by the lingering beams ere he sinks into the ocean to rise upon the far Orient. We of California are proud of our northwestern sister state. We rejoice most heartily in their prosperity and their prospects."

Old Reel-Foot Killed.

This old bear who has been a terror to the stockmen of Jackson, Klamath and Siskiyou counties, has at last been killed. Jas. L. Coyle, of Henley, writes these particulars to the Yreka Journal: Billy Wright and a boy named Bean, killed the celebrated grizzly "Club Foot" one day last week about 7 miles from here. The cattlemen of this vicinity had a bounty of \$75 offered, and I understand a bounty of \$100 or more was offered in Southern Oregon. Wright and Bean found his track at 9 a. m., and followed it until noon, when they located him in a thicket of scrub oak, near Dish Springs. Rocks were rolled down the hill, and the bear came out. Both fired at the same time, and the grizzly fell, but immediately got up again and started for the boys. He got within thirty or forty feet of them, and dropped dead. Ten shots were fired, and all were found in his body, two passing through his heart. He measured ten inches between the ears and 18 inches from nose to top of head. The toes were cut off in a trap seven or eight years ago, which gave him the name of "Club foot." His track was unmistakable, and he has killed hundreds of dollars worth of cattle in this vicinity and Southern Oregon, in the past twelve years. He weighed over 1,000 pounds. The boys skinned him carefully, and intend having the hide stuffed for exhibition. He has been systematically hunted for, for several years, and cattle-men consider this a stroke of good luck, that he has been killed at last.
