A Deserved Compliment.

The Portland World is correct when it says:
Among the best nominations made by the Democrats of any in the state, is Hon. R. M. Veatch of Lane county, for State Senator. He is an able man, and one of the most faithful representatives the people of any county have ever honored with a seat in the senate. His election should not be made doubtful. The entire county ticket of old Lane is an excellent one.

David P. Thompson, Republican nominee for Governor, is interested in seventeen banks.

He has large interests in the Oregon City banks, and a proposition for the state to buy them will undoubtedly be made at the next session of the legislature. If elected David would attend to his own interests, at least he has done so without a break in the past. The farmer, mechanic and laborer should be careful about supporting a capitalist who has never moved in any matter unless there was money in it. Portland papers are publishing the record of his parsimony. Although reputed a millionaire, he did not subscribe one cent to the new Portland hotel, the Chamber of Commerce building, and the Hunt railroad. He opened his heart wide, however, to the Seattle and Johnston suffers, and donated \$10 to each. In conspicuous contrast was the action of Gov. Pennoyer, who on learning of the Seattle fire loaded two cars with lumber and forwarded it immediately.

Had the Portland Bull Run non-taxable water bond bill become a law, several millions of local capital would have been withdrawn from circulation making a stringency in the money market, allowing banks to have their own terms on money.

David Thompson voted for that bill six times. Governor Pennoyer vetoed it. The legislature sustained the governor, and the people will emulate the example of the legislature in June.

In 18 months 68 woolen mills have been sold out by the sheriff in Philadelphia alone.

This is the reign of high-tariff. Be it remembered, and even if wool should be lower this summer than under Cleveland all the Republican orators will have to do is to make bigger promises, abuse the Democratic party and cry rebel.

A Thrilling Episode.

Last evening as the passenger train from the south, drawn by freight engine No. 28, was nearing Medford, the wood in the tender took fire and the breeze caused it to burn. The train soon resulted in a wild conflagration in the car. Turning on a full head of steam the engineer ran for water, coming into Medford with the three flames rolling up, and the train running at 50 miles an hour. Pausing at the depot the trainmen succeeded in uncoupling the tender from the mail car, and the engineer soon had the blaze subdued at the water tank. The mail car was beginning to blaze and the stop was made some 100 yards. Two tramps riding on the bumpers between the tender and mail car were badly scared and somewhat scorched. When the alarm was given at the depot a hurried stream of passengers poured from the cars. The mishap occasioned little delay, but only the prompt action of the engineer averted a catastrophe.—Jacksonville Times, April 25th.

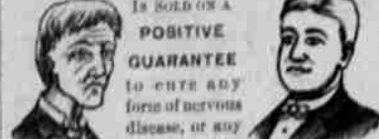

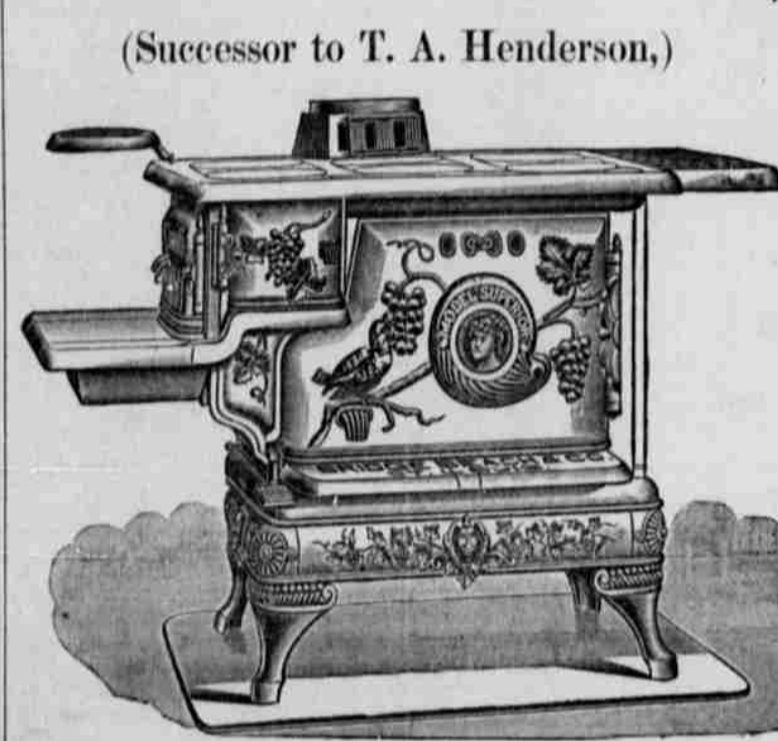

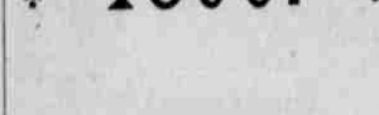
