Lakeview Examiner April 24th. The winter of 1889-90 will long be remembered by the settlers of Eastern Oregon. The percent of loss is hard to tell, but in our judgment it is fully one-half. This winter was harder than ten years ago when we lost fully 40 per cent. The loss of last winter will not be known till this fall. The loss has been universal all over Eastern Oregon and Nevada. In the long run the loss will not be felt so much as many may think as we will have better grass and more range for what is left and better prices. Our country was overstocked and another dry winter and scarcity of water and grass the stock would have died in the summer and fall. The sheep men will recover first from their losses. The time is come when we will have to keep smaller herds and better stock. Then we will make more money on smaller capital and less expense in proportion than we do now. Then the stock business will be more universal and every ranch will keep a small herd. Everybody is putting in grain that can get seed. No potatoes to be had for love nor money. The Silver Lake bed is about two-thirds covered with water and lots of snow in the mountains to come out yet.
