The outspoken declaration of Senator Plumb, of Kansas, against the imposition of a 300 per cent. tariff, greatly annoys some Republicans.

The Atchinson Free Press, Kansas' leading Republican newspaper, is now more violent against the high tariff than ever was Grover Cleveland.

The Hon. Wm. E. Chandler, United States Senator from New Hampshire, and a Republican leader of national prominence, must have grouped these things together in his mind lately when he said:

"There is not a ghost of a chance of our carrying either the next house or the next presidential election, if we make our whole issue on the tariff and other questions concerning the country's material interests."

"That is why it becomes necessary for the Republicans to pass a bill 'to do our own counting and our own certifying.'"

But they should let up on Plumb.

The Rump Congress.

Philadelphia Times. The Speaker was created a despot to assure the prompt fulfillment of party obligations and to win the confidence of the country by the enactment of all needed measures in time for an early adjournment.

Under the specious plea of allowing the majority to rule, the speaker has artfully and in defiance of a century of accepted legislative law, assumed the right to declare the act of the minority to be the act of the majority; and sovereign States have been admitted into the Union, and many measures of the gravest import have been declared passed by a minority of the body.

With all this despotic power to hasten legislation, the only important result achieved is a looted treasury, an assured deficiency instead of a surplus, and the promise of increased taxes on labor, instead of reduced taxes on the necessities of business and life.

The surplus that has been reduced by the reduction of taxes, has been wasted by unprecedented profligacy; the House on one occasion voting more than a million a minute for a pension bill that only politicians, pension sharks and army dead-beats favored.

And not only is the surplus wasted, but a forced loan of some \$50,000,000 has been made from a sacred trust fund to save the Treasury from actual bankruptcy, and many needed appropriations must now be postponed indefinitely, while increased taxes on industry are threatened in the new tariff bill.

An Expensive Government.

The fact that a protective tariff is pernicious and that while robbing the many for the benefit of the few it breeds profligate schemes, is nowhere better shown than in the cost of this government. During John Quincy Adams' administration, the government of this country was carried on for about \$10,000,000 a year. The population is six times as great as then, and the cost of the government thirty times as great.

Senator Turpie put the truth about tin into a nutshell when he said that the demand for a tax was merely "a speculation on the part of a tinless tin-plate association." There is no proof that there is any tin ore in this country—certainly not in quantities sufficient to give it commercial value.

The contest for congressman in the 16th Ohio district this fall will be one of the most interesting in the nation. This is McKinley's district, and the republicans will undoubtedly renominate him.

The Marshaltown (Iowa) Gazette has the following to say of Oregon's popular governor: "The Times, published at Portland Oregon, comments on the probable presidential candidacy of Governor Pennington without, perhaps, knowing that the Farmers' alliance all over the Union, and in Iowa, especially, look upon the Oregon governor as a man just suited to the tastes of the common people."

When Villard realizes his dream of electricity as the substitute for steam, it is understood that much faster time will be made on railroads, the engine having no fuel or water to carry. The time between New York and St. Paul is to be much less than ten hours. At a rate of 150 miles an hour, says the St. Paul Globe, there will be suggestion of fast time.

It is estimated that not less than 40,000 bales of hops will be gathered this year from the fields lying between Tacoma and Snoqualmie. About 20,000 bales have been sold already at 18 cents a pound. On Friday of last week they were quoted at 31 cents. The hop-picking season will begin this year about September 10, and will last about three weeks.

Since the Farmers' Alliance in Alabama have declared in their platform against the nomination of lawyers for office, Senator Morgan has applied to the courts for annulment of his license and has sent in his application for admission into the Alliance. He does not propose to stay down.

The census reveals the fact that the rural portions of New York and other eastern States have decreased in population since 1880, the decrease in some counties being ten per cent. or over.

The U. S. Cruiser Charleston has been ordered to Honolulu to protect American interests in the event of an anticipated Hawaiian revolution.

Young Thurston, son of ex-Senator Thurston, is gray-haired and has but one arm. He lost the other several years ago, by an accident.

Mr. Gladstone in his last speech reeled off a single sentence containing 214 words, and these required twenty-four lines of type, in the London News.

John P. Irish, editor of the S. F. Alta, has been nominated for Congress in a California district.

Confronted by a Great Peril.

From Vent's Speech in the Senate. Advocates of high tariff taxation, are confronted by the great peril of depression in agricultural interests. The emphatic demands of the farmers for something beside lying statistics and frothy declamations, have caused the president and Secretary Blaine to request congress legislation for subsidies to steamships, and for reciprocity treaties with the South American states in order to obtain a foreign market for American products.

An interesting wedding took place at Pendleton last Sunday. The contracting parties were Miss Anna Kristina Kanti and John Harala, a prosperous farmer residing north of Pendleton. The bride recently crossed the seas from Finland to join her husband-to-be, arriving in Pendleton, in safety. She is unable to understand English, and the marriage services had to be interpreted. The bride and bridegroom had never seen each other until the arrival of the bride at Pendleton.

Grants Pass Courier. Rev. Jesse Kirk, the Indian divine of the Klamath Indian reservation, with his wife and three children, attended conference, and from him we learn that there are 200 Indian Christians on the reservation, all being Methodists except about 12 of the Modoc tribe who believe in the doctrine preached by the Quakers. At the present time they have two schools with an attendance of 200.

Gen. W. H. Odell, of the Salem and Silverton roller line company, has proposed to the citizens of Salem and Silverton to immediately commence work on the proposed line, if the two towns will take \$30,000 of bonds—become stockholders to that amount. The total amount necessary is \$150,000 and \$120,000 is taken by eastern men. A committee was appointed by the business men of Salem Wednesday to confer with the representatives of the eastern stock holders.

Walla Walla Statesman: A faithless wife at Palouse City deserted her blind husband on Thursday for a man named Z. A. Perkins. The despoiler of his happy home, the betrayer of friend-ship—they were brother knights—gained access to the family circle while the unfortunate man was hopelessly blind, and then accomplished the alienation of the wife's love for her husband.

Senator Gorman is said to be the handsomest man in the United States senate. He is a Presbyterian, and of the few members of the upper house who pay sufficient respect to the chaplain's prayer to be present when it is uttered. He has been nicknamed "Cardinal."
