**A Terrible Fall.**  
August 30th was the last day of the fair at Woodfield, Ohio, and more than 10,000 people assembled to see the final races and balloon ascension by Professor Carter, a well-known aeronaut. The balloon was a simple hot air affair and was kept in its position over a furnace by ropes held by bystanders. When it had been inflated and all ready, Carter gave the word to let go. The balloon shot upwards and thousands of spectators were horrified to see dangling at the end of the line Milton Redin, the most promising young man of the company and an officer of the fair association. Hundreds of persons shouted to him to drop, but Redin was either entangled or had lost his head, and he clung frantically to the rope, attempting to climb up the slender line into the basket. A number of women in the dense crowd fainted and all the spectators grew sick with horror as the balloon moved upward and began to move southward. Carter could be seen making desperate efforts to draw up the rope on which he swung to and fro. For ten minutes their efforts continued, and then at a height of over 1000 feet, the balloon took a sudden lurch. Redin's hold was loosened and his body shot downward. It was found half a mile away. The clothing was torn off, all his bones broken and his body crushed out of all human semblance. Redin's brothers and sisters were in the throng and saw his terrible fall.

**Coos Bay Railroad.**  
The Roseburg Review of August 29 has the following dispatch from Marshfield, giving particulars of work on the railroad connecting Roseburg and Coos Bay: This morning a force of 50 men were put to work clearing the right of way for the Roseburg & Coos Bay railroad. Superintendent Seeley has charge of the work, and will increase the force to at least a hundred hands as soon as they can be secured here. Twenty-five yoke of oxen have been secured from Noble's logging camp and will be used on the road. In conversation with your correspondent Messrs. King and Seeley stated that many men and teams would be needed in course of two or three weeks. As soon as the right of way has been cleared for a sufficient distance the grading force would be put on, and they in turn would be followed by the bridge carpenters and track layers. They are hardly ready for a full force of men and do not wish to fill the town with unemployed laborers. They have promised to notify the people of Douglas county through the Review when they are prepared to employ any large number of men and teams. All connected with the management seem desirous of giving Douglas county every possible benefit to be derived from the construction of the roads.

The work will be pushed with all reasonable dispatch, and many hundreds of thousands of dollars will be put in circulation in Douglas and Coos counties, through this enterprise. Contractor Graham and his attorney, F. W. Burnett, left to-day for San Diego, from whence Mr. Graham's grading outfit will be shipped. T. R. Sheridan, president of the construction company, arrived here yesterday, and will remain some time.  
The surveying party are making good progress, and the road is located several miles out from town. The right of way will now be cleared before them, which will materially aid their progress.

**Popular Election of Senators.**  
N. Y. World.  
Some of the State Conventions are inserting a plank in their platforms favoring the election of United States Senators by the people. This would be to give us two Houses of Representatives, and totally change the character of our government as respects its legislative branch.  
The tradition is that the Senate owes its existence to Washington. He had seen in the old Continental Congress the impolicy of conducting government by a legislative body all elected in one way, and argued the propriety of two chambers by the apt, if homely, illustration, "It cools the tea to pour it into the saucer out of the cup."  
When the propriety of his suggestion was conceded the question arose as to how the two chambers should be selected, and it was determined that one should be chosen directly and the other indirectly by the people, so that one should pulsate to the popular first impulse and the other to the sober second thought. The wisdom of this arrangement has been approved by the experience of a century. The House is the spur and the Senate the brake under which we have had safe riding for a hundred years. Each tempers the other and both make a perfect balance.  
The plan is as old as the time when our Teutonic ancestors roamed the wilds of Germania, the representatives of the hundreds forming one house and the people at large another; and we see no present necessity for a sweeping change.

The Central Daily News says: Mr. Harvey Scott, the editor and proprietor of the Portland Oregonian, in a recent interview in Seattle, was asked his opinion in regard to the McKinley bill, and replied: "It is simply like all other efforts—a piece of patch work, as by efforts short of absolute free trade must be. It is conceded on all sides that some interests must be protected. But the trouble is each man wants to put the other on the free list. I am in theory a free trader, but doubt if it will come in this generation. However, it is sure to be the inevitable result in time." Yet, notwithstanding this, the Oregonian is a firm adherent and defender of the McKinley measure. Further comment is unnecessary.

**A Klamath County Tragedy.**  
A Linkville dispatch of August 31 says: About 9 o'clock this morning near the residence of N. S. Goodlow in Langall valley, Tom Miles shot and fatally wounded Josh Buckmaster. The ball entered Buckmaster's body just below the right shoulder and came out through his left breast. Miles exhibited a bullet hole in his hat which he claims was made by a bullet from Buckmaster's weapon. The shooting is the outgrowth of the Shook-Goodlow tragedy, which occurred here about two months ago, and in which the latter was killed. The quarrel rose out of a dispute between the Goodlow and Shook factions concerning the possession of some cattle which Tom Miles and others were rounding up. Buckmaster cannot recover.  
Miles sided with the Shook and Buckmaster with the Goodlow faction. The disagreement over cattle claims at the round-up was the direct cause of the first shooting, but apart from that an old-time feud has existed between the two factions. It is said cattle stealing has been carried on extensively for years. Cases brought to court have been cleared by establishing alibis, generally believed to be concocted by the offending party, and that to such an extent has the cattle thieving faction gained control over the community that no one thinks of appealing to the law for redress, knowing any evidence would be met by counter-evidence agreed upon by the defendant's party. General sympathy seems to be with the Shook people. More shooting is expected. To use an expression of one well acquainted with the circumstances, "that's only two killed."

**A Foreible Argument.**  
In the Senate last week Senator Carlisle presented an argument which no Senator could answer when he showed by price lists and actual bills of sales that certain American manufacturers, who are given an increase of duty upon products similar to those manufactured by them upon their plea that they are necessary to prevent their being driven out of business by foreign competitors, are selling their manufactures in foreign countries much cheaper—in some cases 33 and 50 per cent less—than they sell the same articles in the United States. Mr. Carlisle said he thought, and the consumers undoubtedly think with him, that these manufacturers could afford to forego the present tariff to send their goods to foreign countries to compete with foreign manufacturers of the articles, and sell them for less than they did at home, that it would be manifestly unjust to the home buyers to raise the duty in order to allow these manufacturers to make their American customers pay a still higher price.

The Harney Items is responsible for the following frog item: Oh, for another Moses! Be it known that this valley has had a second edition of the second plague of Pharaoh, only ours has lasted much longer than the historical one. This is for the reason that we have not the means at hand for getting away from the frogs that the Egyptians had. Frogs to the right of us, frogs to the left of us, and frogs everywhere. At one time about two months ago they were estimated by the square mile in the northern part of this valley. The hot weather of July had the effect of disposing of them, or rather they disposed of themselves by sinking into the ground. The least excuse of a shower brings countless numbers of them into action. They are a new kind of frog for this locality, and no one has yet been able to ascertain where they came from. And it goes without saying that no one cares where they go, so long as they go. One peculiar nature of the reptile is that he always jumps toward the north. Every individual frog seems bent upon some destination north of here.

Jacksonville Times: The leading members of the M. E. Church evidently do not like Gen. E. L. Applegate's original manner of administering the affairs of the Klamath Indian reservation, as they "resolved" strongly against him at the late conference at Grant's Pass. These religious gentlemen are much incensed because they lost control of that bench, especially as it is now filled by an agnostic. "Lish does not claim to be an angel, but they think he is as honest and intelligent as the average preacher; hence he has dispensed with all spiritual advisers at the Klamath agency.

Albany Democrat, Sept. 1st: The recount of Salem begins this morning. That is, the recount of the four precincts, reaching into the country several miles, which will erroneously be given as the population of the city, as it was in the case of Albany and other places. As considerable has been said on the subject, it may be said that the Salem precincts cover an area of about 152 1/2 miles, while Albany's only cover about 8 1/2 miles, practically less. In either case, or any other case, it is not right to give the city the credit of the whole precincts.
