No More Special Appropriations. A decision has been rendered by Judge Boise in the circdit court of Yamhill county that will effectually dispose of future jobs in the legislature for appropriations for wagon roads and bridges throughout the state. The Salem Journal gives the following informa-

Judge R. P. Boise, circuit judge of this judicial district rendered a decision in Yam-hill county this week which bad it been rendered eighteen months ago and been sustained by the supreme court, would have left over \$130,000 in the state treasury for

purposes recognized by the law.

As will be remembered, several appropriations were made by the last legislature, aggregating the amount above mentoined for the building of wagon roads in mountainous districts of the state in Lake and Klamath counties, in the Coos bay country, in Tillamook and other points. The money in all cases has been drawn from the state in all cases has been drawn from the state treasury and presumably spent as contemplated, but Representative Maxwell, of Tillamook, who had charge of that work and appropriation became involved in a difficulty with his constituency and the county court refused to pay the claim for superintending the work. He brought a suit against the county, taking a change of venue to Yamhill where the case has been thrown out of court, upon motion, for want of jurisdiction, Judge Boise holding that the act of the legislature appropriating the money was unconstitutional. It is probable Mr. Maxwell will carry the case to the supreme court and the result there, while it cannot affect the treasury so far as the acts in question are concerned, may have a marked influence on future legislation in that line. Those special appropriation schemes, covering comparatively small sums here and there are great levers whereby vicious legislation in the interest of monopolies is carried through successfully. monopolies is carried through successfully.
