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

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

> DYING OF WANT. The fact remains, however, and grows more patent each succeeding year, that hundreds of people are slowly dying of want

and exposure in the very land where immigration is solicited. The people are in abject want and their distress can only be relieved by large donations or by regulated state aid. In Rooks and Phillips counties over half the farms have been abandoned to the mortgagees, who had placed large sums on worthless land and have property upon which they cannot realize one-half of their loan and for which they can get no tenants.

### Increased Representation.

If the leaves are burned, he would add more water. He prefers arsenical poisons to all others. Mr. Wallace's experience with spraying for codlin moth was not altogether satisfactory. Observations last year up to July 1st failed to find any apples affected. After this date the damage was considerable. It is necessary to spray up to the time of picking. Spraying should be dones every two weeks. He has implicit faith in London purple and Paris green if properly applied. He described what should be a perfect sprayer. The nozzle should be such ato give the finest possible spray. He said the wooly aphis is the worst enemy to the apple orchard. Working in the root as well as the branches, and the cottony substance eneasing the insect being impervious to any spray, there is apparently no way to eradicate the nuisance. He tried many different methods or specifics without effect. The green aphis is not so much to be feared, The lady bug is an enemy of this insect. Remedies for the green aphis as published in bulletins issued by the state board of horticulture, have proved effectual. The only insect troubling his pear or cherry trees is the slug. This is successfully combatted dy applying remedies as published in the board's bulletin.
