### NEW YORK'S WATER TOWER.

A Department Chief Explains How the Apparatus is Worked.

In principle the towers are very simple. There is an iron tube so pivoted over one end of a truck that its top may be raised to a height of sixty feet above the street pavement. The upper end terminates in a nozzle. Connected with the bottom of the pipe is a very large hose. From two to four engines may be coupled to this hose, and their united streams forced up through the pipe and out of the nozzle. The nozzle is controlled by a man on the truck, so that a solid 2 1/2 inch stream may be directed through the top windows of a six story building with ease and certainty. The newest tower in the department differs from the older ones in several important details.

The old tower had to be raised by hand power, and it was a slow and tiresome job. Moreover, the old tower was made in sections and had to be screwed together by the men. The new tower has a twenty-eight foot pipe suspended inside of a slender steel derrick that is twenty-two feet high. The derrick is pivoted over the forward wheels of the truck and when not in use, it, with the pipe inside, lies prone upon the truck. At a fire the derrick is erected by means of what may be called, engine power—the piston rods of two cylinders, which are very like steam engine cylinders, connect with the bottom of the derrick. Instead of steam, however, carbonic acid gas, which is generated in a retort suspended near the rear axle of the truck, is used.

This retort is partly filled with soda and water, and when the time comes for raising the tower a small quantity of vitriol is spilled into this mixture. The gas is generated in sufficient quantity to create a pressure in the cylinders of above 100 pounds to the square inch, and it is this power, exerted through the cylinders, that raises the derrick. The pipe is elevated above the derrick by means of a stout metal rope working over pulleys and a hand winch. The stream from the tower can be swung around in any direction and thrown up or down through a wide arc.—John R. Spears in Scribner's.

### Undergraduate Fervency.

It owed its existence to a passage in "Charles O'Malley," in which Mr. Frank Webb disguised himself as an itinerant organist and went about the streets of Dublin playing on a hurdy-gurdy and collecting coppers. The government ought to have dealt very generously with our novelists, for few men have sent so many into the army as Charles Lever or so many into the navy as Capt. Marryat. I have known more cases than one of university men who have imitated Lever's whimsical notion of a practical joke; several university men have gone about the streets with blackened faces as Christy minstrels.

A little gain of the streets was, however, too sharp for the undergraduate, although he was got up in the most approved hurdy-gurdy style and worked away lustily at the organ handle. The short street boy followed him for some time with great admiration, but with a serious doubt in his mind. Then he walked up to the itinerant musician and said: "You're not a hurdy-gurdy man. Look at your boots. Look at your hands. I'll go and tell the proctor." The discomfited undergraduate skeddaddled to his rooms, and sent his very moderate earnings to a hospital.—Temple Bar.

### The Faithless Work of Great Poets.

It is usually said, in hasty generalization, that the poetry of the present age is unique in the extreme refinement of its exterior mechanism. Those who say this are not aware that the great poets whose virile simplicity and robust carelessness of detail they applaud have almost without exception been scrupulously attentive to form. No modern writer has been so learned in rhythm as Milton, so faultless in rhyme arrangement as Spenser. But what is true is that a care for form and a considerable skill in the technical art of verse have been acquired by writers of a lower order, and that this sort of perfection is no longer the hall mark of a great master.

We may expect it, therefore, to attract less attention in the future, and although assuredly the jargon of Walt Whitman will not be accepted, technical perfection will more and more be taken as a matter of course, as a portion of the poet's training which shall be as indispensable and as little worthy of notice as that a musician should read his notes correctly.—Edmund Gosse in Forum.

### The Odd People of Shetland.

The stranger will still find many curious and interesting relics of olden days and ways in Shetland. The ancient village or "town" of Sound, two miles from Lerwick, is a veritable nest of old old folks and things. The inhabitants pride themselves on possessing the exact spot of ground on which their ancestors dwelt for more than a thousand years. They show fine scars for "cogstair Lerwick" in the oft quoted couplet:

Sound was sound when Lerwick was name;  
Sound it is sound when Lerwick is dumb!  
and the "Sound wives" still visit Lerwick on Saturdays with their "kashies" on their backs, their knitting in full swing, and their noses high in lofty contempt, waiting on one another until all are done with their errands or shopping, and then returning to Sound, the embodiment of haughty toleration.—Cor. Boston Transcript.

### Visitors in the Sick Room.

One of the most difficult things to manage is, not unfrequently, the matter of visitors. Comparatively few persons can visit the sick without doing more harm than good. Bedridden people and persons confined to their chambers or their homes by chronic ailments may often be greatly helped by friendly calls, by various little tangible expressions of sympathy, and in general by sunshine brought from the outside world, although even in such cases wisdom is required.—Youth's Companion.

## The New Oregon Fish Law.

Salmon shall not be taken in the Columbia or its tributaries between the first day of March and the 10th day of April, or between the 10th day of August and the 10th day of September, or between 6 o'clock Saturday and 6 o'clock Sunday during the close season; salmon shall not be caught within one mile below any rack erected for the purpose of obtaining fish by propagation; salmon shall not be taken in any waters of this state except the Columbia and its tributaries from November 15 to April 1; nets, traps and weirs shall not extend more than one-third across any stream, channel or slough; lime, gas, cocculus, indigo, or any substance deleterious to fish, must not be thrown into any stream. From March 1st to April 10th it shall be a misdemeanor to have in possession, offer for sale or transport any chinook salmon, silver salmon, steelheads or bluebacks. No dam nor other obstruction shall be built across any stream without a suitable ladder or fishway be provided. Sawdust must not be thrown into any stream or placed where high water will carry it away. The term salmon is construed to include chinook, steelhead, blueback, silverides, and all other species of salmon. All fines collected shall be paid into a fund for the use of the fish commission. Nets, traps and weirs must be taken out of the rivers, or closed during the close season. Pound nets and traps must be numbered, and at night time a bright white light must be shown.

### Veto of Agricultural Bill.

The following is the full text of Gov. Penoyer's veto message on this bill: To the Honorable, the Senate of the State of Oregon: I herewith return Senate Bill No. 134 with my disapproval. This bill creates two new agricultural societies and appropriates to one the sum of \$1500 and to the other the sum of \$3000 annually. This is an appropriation of money raised by a general tax for a local purpose and for a purpose entirely foreign to that for which the taxing power was conferred upon the government by the people. I veto the bill. SILVESTER PENOYER, Governor.

### A Good Example.

A few days ago Hon. F. R. Lubbock, who for twelve years has been state treasurer of Texas, turned over to his successor \$25,087,839 in funds and securities. In these twelve years Treasurer Lubbock has handled over \$90,000,000 of the state's money and property, and not a dollar of it has stuck to his fingers or found its way into the fingers of any of his friends. The statement also made authoritatively that since the organization of the government of Texas in 1836 there has never been a dollar of shortage or defalcation in its treasury.

The Jackson county bar has recommended the appointment of Hon. P. P. Prim of Jacksonville as the additional judge for the first district. Judge Prim occupied the bar in this district for twenty years continuously, and was also one of the members of the supreme court when it was re-organized in 1878. He would no doubt fill the position efficiently and satisfactorily. The appointee must reside in either Klamath or Lake counties, and also hold court in other districts when called upon to do so.—Ashland Record.
