

Exhibiting His Sore Head.

Since the election in June the man that writes those wonderful editorials for the Register has had a bad case of "sore head."

This week his usual assault on some business or industry is confined to the Grand Jury. He alleges that we have made an over-charge for printing 7,000 assessor's blanks.

Assessor McPherson ordered 7,000 printed blanks from the Grand office, and that is all Mr. McPherson had to do with it.

Examined the bills of the past two years, and made out his bill, and charged just what Mr. H. R. Kincaid of the Journal had charged for the years 1889 and 1890 for the same work.

More than that, the Eugene Register has printed thousands of subpoenas, not near the size of the assessment blanks, and with less than one-fourth the work of typesetting.

There is no terror for us in the Register's bray. As a Lazarus, exhibiting his sores and begging from one end of the street to the other is interesting and ridiculous.

The sacred trust which Grover Cleveland surrendered into the hands of Benjamin Harrison, two years ago, unscathed and unstained, has been dragged in the mire of corruption, and is now the scum and scum of the world.

The ordinary expenses of government have vastly increased, until each department has become a reservoir of corruption, extravagance, favoritism and abuse of power.

The third or fourth rate Indiana lawyer, the law partner of the president, who was foisted into the position of attorney-general, has brought his important department down to the level of petty rogues and legal sharks.

The pension office is rotten to the core. One wretched, discredited commissioner has been kicked out and a worse one put in his place.

The navy department has gone into the expensive and wholly unauthorized business of arming the extravagance of European navies by the building of battle ships, which this country does not need.

The Sunday School Chabad, who was taken from his bargain counter in Philadelphia, and made postmaster-general, as a reward for his contribution to the republican national corruption fund, has increased the expenses and diminished the efficiency of his department until it has become the synonym of misadministration.

Synopsis of General Land Laws.

The following is a synopsis of the general land laws of March, 1891.

Section 1 repeals the timber culture act, and gives the rights of all existing entries, and gives a right of commutation to those who have for four years, in good faith, tried to comply, at \$1.25 per acre.

Section 2 provides modification of the desert-land act, providing fairly for actual reclamation of the land entered, and preventing speculative accumulation of the land, with a saving of all rights under existing entries.

Section 3 enlarges section 2285, revised statutes, by including reservoirs, or ditches, for irrigating purposes.

Section 4 repeals the pre-emption laws, with a modification of the homestead law, and with provisions more strict as to proofs at entry and all final proofs, extending the commutation from six to fourteen months.

Sections 7 and 8 provide details as to final action in the Interior Department on final entries, and provide limitations as to contests and suits to cancel patents, fixing the latter at five years as to patents now issued and six years as to future ones, and provisions as to timber trespasses.

Section 9 prohibits offering of public lands at public sale hereafter, thus preventing private or cash entries.

Sections 10 to 17 relate to land in Alaska, for their acquisition for manufacturing and commercial purposes and for townsites.

Section 17 allows mineral entries, in addition to the maximum allowance of 320 acres allowed by existing law.

Sections 18, 19, 20 and 21 relate to ditches and reservoirs, and provides for their construction.

Section 22 certifies to the titles of settlers on certain former Indian lands caused by different rulings of the Department of the Interior.

Section 25 authorizes the President to set apart trust reserves, where to preserve timber, he shall deem it advisable.

The American Economist, published in the interest of protected manufacturers, is putting forth herculean efforts to show that the McKinley bill did not increase the prices of goods upon which the duty had been placed, while McKinley, the father of the tariff measure, frankly proclaims that that is the chief purpose of a protective tariff.

If the statement in the annual report of the U. S. commissioner of labor, that the cost of producing a ton of steel rails is less in America than in England and other European countries, be true, and we have no reason for believing it otherwise, the only object obtained by putting a high tariff upon steel rails is to increase the profits of the American manufacturer of them.

Friends of Harrison are putting themselves at the trouble of telegraphing all over the country that Dudley will not accompany him on his trip to the Pacific coast.

Hon. John Minto has been appointed a special agent of the department of agriculture of the United States, on the sheep industry of the northwest.

Mr. Charles Groves, of McMinnville, left last week for Europe. He carries a recommendation from the Chamber of Commerce of Portland at being interested in the introduction of the best sugar industry in the state.

The Oregon penitentiary now contains 337 convicts, this number being the greatest that institution ever contained before.
