Synopsis of General Land Laws. The following is a synopsis of the general

Indiaws of March, 1891: Section I repeals the timber culture set, but saves the rights of all existing entries, and gives a right of commutation to those who have for four years, in good faith, tried ackamas to comply, at \$1.25 per acre. Section 2 provides modification of the desert-land act, providing fully for actual reclamation of the land entered, and pre-venting speculative accumulation of the land with a saving of all rights under ex-




