

National Bankruptcy in Sight.

New York Tribune. Until next December Democratic papers will be full of tirades about Republican extravagance in appropriations. Whether these censures are in any respect deserved or not they will produce an impression on the public mind. The next Congress will be closely watched to see whether it is more economical. If it cuts down expenditures for the needed work of the Government it will be justly commended. If it cuts off pensions for Union veterans it will be condemned. But if it appropriates as large an amount as the recent Congress it will be compelled to increase taxation in order to prevent National bankruptcy. The recent Congress began its work with a large surplus to be distributed, and that exists no longer. There is not offered to the Democrats next Winter so pleasant an alternative as some of them imagine.

At a recent trial in New Orleans of Sicilians charged with the assassination of Chief of Police Hennessy in October last, six of the accused were acquitted and three held for a new trial, the jury not agreeing on their cases. Evidence was furnished that the jury was bribed. A meeting of the citizens was held Saturday morning when speeches were made, leaders appointed, when the assassination of several thousand determined men, many of them prominent citizens of New Orleans, marched to the city jail, forced the doors and shot to death eleven Sicilians charged with the assassination. The citizens then quietly dispersed. A society of responsible men, however, is holding a meeting for many bloody deeds and unlawful acts in New Orleans. The prompt action of the citizens it is thought has dealt a death blow to the society.

Dr. E. L. Irvine, who has been the second assistant physician in the Oregon state insane asylum since 1887, has tendered his resignation as such and removed to Portland where he will continue the practice of his profession. In this connection it might be stated that as per report of the legislative committee a third assistant physician is required, the increasing number of patients making the work too much for the present force. There will, therefore, be two new physicians appointed at an early day, a second and third assistant.—Salem Statesman.

It will be some time before the country fully realizes the magnitude of the raid on the treasury made by the Fifty-first congress. When all the details of the clean-up are generally known the present contempt for Reed's House will be turned into active wrath. Such an extravagant congress has not assembled in twenty years. Even the notorious Congress of Keifer and Robeson did not squander as much as this one. Reed's rule will be found to have been an expensive experiment for the taxpayer.—Alta.

The bill giving foreign authors, a copyright in the United States has been signed by the president and is now a law. It places foreign authors on the same footing as citizens, on condition that application for copyright has been made on or before the day of publication in this or any foreign country, and provided also that the book is printed from type set within the limits of the United States or from plates therefrom.

It is now evident that the Democratic majority in Iowa has come to stay. The various municipal elections held in that state last week justify the claim made by the Democrats that the people of Iowa want Democratic supremacy.

Governor Penneyer has announced that he will not appoint another circuit judge in the first district as provided by the legislature, as he finds the law imperfect. Thus another steal is frustrated by the governor.

Weather Report.

WEATHER. The autumn and winter months, up to February 1, were warmer and drier than usual. February was considerably colder than usual and about the same amount of precipitation occurred; the snow falls in Eastern Oregon being especially heavy; March, so far, has been cool and not an average precipitation. Chinook winds have occurred in Eastern Oregon within the past few days, melting the snow rapidly, the water principally soaking into the earth. In Western Oregon the soil is very wet; spring plowing and seeding have been delayed. Frosts have been frequent but owing to the latent state of vegetation no serious damage was done.

CROPS. Winter wheat is in excellent condition. There has been little freezing out; it has a good color, it is well rooted and the stool is well filled. The snow gradually melting on the wheat fields gives promise of unusually good wheat prospects throughout Eastern Oregon. General reports indicate that at present the conditions were never more favorable for an abundant harvest. The average of fall sown wheat is not an average; owing to the dry autumn, the acreage intended to be sown could not be. The backward spring retards spring sowing. The snow is now nearly off of the wheat districts of Eastern Oregon. In Western Oregon the soil is too wet, excepting on the uplands, for any spring plowing or seeding. Bright warm sunny days are generally wished for. The acreage of fruit trees has been largely increased, and they appear to be all in good condition; fruit buds are swelling and there is an occasional report of blossoms. The snow in the mountains of Eastern Oregon is unusually deep; in Grant county 16 feet are reported to have fallen during the winter. Stock wintered well and is in good condition. Few winters have been more favorable to stock than the one just closed.

Health.—The health of the people is good; a few sections have cases of measles and mumps, but no serious epidemics of unusual health conditions exist.
