A young man about 16 or 17 years old, by the name of Richards, son of James Richards, who lives near Mehama, Marion county, met with an accident Wednesday afternoon of last week which proved fatal. He had been out deer hunting with two other young men, and on his return home with one deer, young Richards was climbing up a bank and pulled his gun up after him, when in some manner it was discharged, the ball entering his groin and lodging just under the skin on the shoulder, having passed through almost his entire body. When the accident occurred he was separated from his companions. After being shot he walked some distance to a farm house when medical aid was summoned. The doctors removed the ball but could do nothing for him. He lived until the next morning.

Statesman: A Polk county hop grower last fall, when hops first came in market, had 58,000 pounds of the redolent berry. He was offered 41 cents a pound for them when the market was at its highest. By the advice of his friends, who expected hops to go up to 50 or 60 cents, he refused to sell them. As a result he now has 58,000 pounds of hops for which he can find no market at a figure above 24 cents. This is a loss of 17 cents on the pound, or \$9,800 on the season's output. This is pretty expensive advice.

The Boston Herald calls attention to the fact that the new Secretary of the Treasury when in Congress voted for the Bland free coinage bill, and when President Hayes vetoed the compromise silver bill he voted to pass the measure over the veto. Mr. Foster, however, says now that he is in accord with the financial policy of President Harrison.

There is a bill before the California legislature to punish newspaper frauds. The provisions of the bill make it a misdemeanor for any newspaper to print a false statement of its circulation, and adequate penalties are affixed for violation of the law. If this law is enforced we shall expect to see the publishers of the leading papers of California in the penitentiary before the close of the year.
