Oregon Weather Bureau.  
WESTERN OREGON.  
Cooler, cloudy and partly cloudy weather has prevailed during the week, especially in southern part, where the rainfall amounts to from sixty-two hundredths of an inch to over one inch.

The previous week having been unusually warm and dry, the changed weather conditions which prevailed this week have proven of great value to crops of all kinds. The soil is again in excellent condition and the growth of vegetation is very marked.

Warmer weather is needed to develop heading of wheat, oats, &c., but the stalk is developing well. Spring sown wheat has made excellent progress. General reports indicate the most flattering prospects for the wheat crop throughout this section.

The rain was of inestimable benefit and value to the wheat crop. The east winds did some damage in parts of Umatilla, Morrow and Wasco counties. The effects of the rain is supposed to offset the damage. The rains have revived the excellent wheat prospects throughout this section.

Many mining claims near Grant's Pass have closed down for the season on account of no water. Nearly all of the miners report good results from the season's run. The quartz mills are busy grinding away and are making money hand over fist as usual. Every quartz ledge now being worked in this county is paying handsome dividends.

Salem Journal: Senator E. T. Hatch has leased his farm near McCoy, and will hereafter be a resident of that much visited and much written territory—Alaska. He has been appointed collector of customs for Sitka, his salary being \$2,500 per year, with enough fees to make it, \$5,000. The residents of Alaska are to be congratulated upon getting so good a citizen as Mr. Hatch.
