A Woman Miner.

Jefferson county, Montana, has a curiosity in the shape of a mine, not only owned, but operated by a woman. The mine is situated on Willow creek, and the fortunate owner is Mrs. Robinson. Although she is 73 years of age she has done all the work in developing the property herself, carrying out the ore and waste upon her back. This she has been able to do from the fact that the shaft is on a mountain incline and comparatively easy of ascent. She has been doing this steadily for two years, and appears to have lost none of the faith with which she started.

If any assay has ever been made of the ore taken out, it remains a secret with the owner; but the outside world is very willing to believe, from her evident faith, that she has a bonanza.

Company G, Third Regiment, O. N. G., recently organized at Pendleton, has been short lived. A meeting was called for Thursday evening to elect a captain to succeed C. J. Fraker, resigned, and so few members appeared that it was decided to let the militia company go to the "demonition bow-wows." Col. Houghton will accordingly be notified of the company's disbandment. This is to be deplored, as Pendleton will have no protection in case of an Indian outbreak or a Chinese riot.

In Australia the government owns the railroads. It only costs a person \$6.50 to ride 1000 miles there. Commutation rates for local services are still lower. A workman can ride to and from his work, a distance of six miles for two cents a trip; 18 miles for 6 cents; 24 miles for 8 cents; 30 miles for 10 cents. Yearly tickets, good for 30 mile trips, are sold for \$17.40. This is the kind of centralization we need in this country. It centralizes bread and meat in the mouths of the workingman's children and clothes on their backs.

The present prospects are that Lane county will be blessed with abundant crops the present year. Grains and grasses are looking splendid and promise a yield far above the average. The price will also be good, a shortage in Europe being apparent from the freezing out of winter grain. If the formidable hop louse will let the hops alone we may enjoy a full measure of prosperity.

Do not discourage any home enterprise. Men are too apt to grumble because projects conceived and being carried into execution at home are not as immense or grand as those at some other city. The field of operation circumscribes the efforts and ambitions of every man or place. Eugene cannot expect to rival Portland, nor that place San Francisco, and so on.

The atmosphere of the nineteenth century is not conducive to the stability of a monarchical government. Brazil was the last country to accept this fact. Portugal will be the next. The signs are multiplying daily which show that that country longs for the free spirit and governmental system of a republic. The sooner she joins the procession the better.

Heretofore they have nobly drawn the salary attached to the office.

The Willamette valley is keeping up her reputation as a sure rain country this season. No damage so far, but haying will soon be on hand and the fall and winter grain do not need the rain.

Since March 1 Robert Andrews has sold and delivered from Halsey \$14,000 worth of fat stock. One notable shipment consisted of a straight train load of yearlings and two-year-olds, and was worth in round figures \$6500.

The last legislature divided the office of county clerk in Union county. Now a test case is being tried as to the legality of the law. The Pendleton East Oregonian says:

R. Eakin, J. W. Shelton, T. H. Crawford and Mr. Carroll are in the city from Union to make further argument before Judge Fee in the case of the recorder and clerk of Union county. The former official commenced a mandamus proceeding to obtain certain books which the clerk has withheld. The clerk brings a "quo warranto" proceeding to see whether the office of county recorder exists in law. The action is a friendly one for the purpose of a test.

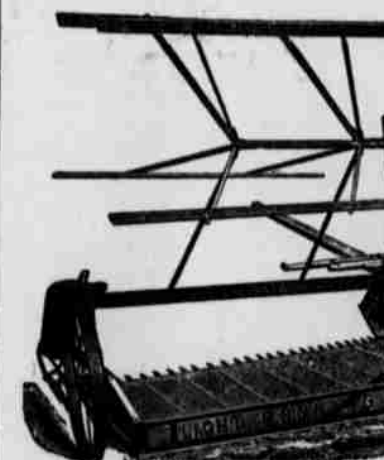
