Florence Notes.

The West, June 12.

Mrs. Wm. Edris, of Eugene, is stopping with her husband out on their ranch south of Glenada.

Wm. N. Snively, of Woodburn, Oregon, came in on Wednesday's boat and is figuring on going into business in Florence.

T. R. and J. C. Berry left-to-day (Friday) for Chelalis to settle some business connected with their lately deceased father's estate.

It is reported that Knisely, the Michigan saw-mill man, has decided to put in a mill at the Lake creek with a capacity of 150,000 feet per day.

M. E. Lucas came over from Gardiner yesterday and is looking up our sawmill facilities. He was formerly head sawyer in a big mill at Gardiner.

Miss Mary Whitney of Eugene has been assigned to teach on summer term of school and is now in Florence in waiting to begin action Monday morning.

On the 20th of this month there will be a meeting of the directors of the Siuslaw & Eastern Railway at Eugene and a day or two thereafter they propose to make a trip over the line to Florence. With these gentlemen will come contractors for grade work and it is more than probable grading will commence in a few weeks after the contracts are let.

For the past few days surveys have been at work surveying and platting Cox's addition to Florence. Yesterday morning a gang of men, with J. A. McConnell in charge, were put to work clearing away logs and cutting underbrush. A new sidewalk will be put down from the corner of Jefferson and Main streets to the west side of the new addition. This addition is west of the original town site and is a part on water front.

There is a whole drove of steamers headed for Florence on the Great Siuslaw. The West scribbs are caught on the following boats which are billed to arrive at this port within the next few days: Chance and Harrison, from Portland, Mischieff—and one other the name of which we did not get onto—from San Francisco. It is also stated that W. F. Stevens, the saw-mill man, is on his way from San Francisco, with a large steam tug and two schooners laden with mill machinery. One of the San Francisco boats will load out of here with lumber from the Siuslaw Lumber Co.'s mills. The Chance came in yesterday loaded with machinery for David & Son's saw and door factory, and merchandise. Postmaster Ely will commence the erection of a new little dwelling-house on Washington street, the same to be used by Dr. Cloyd as office and residence.

THE RAILROAD.—The railroad track was laid to the edge of the city limits of Springfield Saturday evening. The engine will arrive in that city to-day. We congratulate our Sister City on being connected with the outside world with bands of steel.

CORVALLIS BAND ENGAGED.—The Fourth of July committee has made arrangements with the Corvallis brass band to furnish music on the occasion of the celebration in Eugene. The band has an excellent reputation for musical talent and will form an important part in the day's proceedings.

ONE HUSBAND.—There are now over one hundred miners and prospectors at work in the B. & E. river mines, and within one month over 500 miners will be in the district. Look out for rich developments before the summer is over.
