Former Officers Re-Elected-Recommendations by the Executive Committee Approved.

The Board of Regents of the University of Oregon, held a basiness meeting in Eugene, Wednesday, June 17. Present, M. P. Deady and Henry Failing, of Portland, R. S. Bean and A. Bush, of Salem, Dr. S. Hamilton, of Roseburg, T. G. Hendricks and Rodney Scott, of Eugene.

The Executive committee made the following report.

lowing report: To the Honorable the Board of Regents of the University of Oregon.
Gentlemen: The Executive committee

beg leave to submit the following as their Your committee would recommend that the fence around the campus be repaired and painted

That a new side walk be laid between the old building and Villard Hall, and that the walk on the west of the old building to the old building and Villard Hall, and that the walk on the west of the old building to the fence, around campus, he repaired or rebuilt,—the same being in a bad condition.

We would also recommend that the woodwork of Villard Hall be repainted inside and cutside and that the following repairs be made on the old building, namely: That the steps to the east and west fronts of the old building be repaired and placed in a safe condition, and also that window sills in the basement shall be repaired and capped with wood, so that the brick could not be so easily removed or knocked off as at present. The old building should have a new tin roof, the outside cemented or painted and sanded, and all the rooms on the inside, including janitors rooms, kalsomined.

We would also recommend that the gymnasium be cemented, or painted and sanded outside, wainscoted on the inside up to the window sills and plaster the remainder of the brick walls, ceil the wame overhead, put tin gutters around the roof, paint the same on the outside and inside; the lawns around the building should be fertilized and enriched by hauling sandy loam and manure on the same.

The duties of the Janitor have so increased as to render it almost impossible for one man to perform the work required and do man to perform the work required. The man to perform the work required and do
the same in an exceptable manner. The
present janitor is an active, efficient, faithful person, and gives general satisfaction to
the professors and students, but he cannot
perform all the work required of him.

On the 1st of April, 1831, the janitor employed Mr. Jas. Drake as an assistant at a
salary of \$25 per month and board. This
he did with the knowledge and consent of
the Executive committee, without promise
of any renumeration from us, and while we
did not give him any promise to pay any

of any renumeration from us, and while we did not give him any promise to pay any part of the amount paid for hire of an assistant, yet we think he ought to be paid.

We would recommend that the sum of \$300 per annum be allowed the janitor for the employment of an assistant, that the pay of said assistant commence on the 1st of April, 1891,—the assistant to be employed by the consent and direction of the Executive committee.

Your committee would call attention to the report of the Legislative Committee, without any r-comm-ndations.

The committee think there should be a librarian appointed to keep the library room

open for the use of the University at reasonable hours; the books in the library at present should all be listed, and the list printed in form, so as to prevent duplication of the books.

We made a contract with the Electric light company, of Eugene, Oregon, to light the buildings and furnish two incandescent lights, one in front of Villard Hall and one between the buildings, at \$8 per month, payable quarterly.

It was ordered that the repairs and im-

provements be made in accordance with he recommendations of the Executive commit-

The officers of the board were re-elected Matthew P. Deady, President.
