

American Breadstuff Will be Wanted.

The state department at Washington has received a report on the harvest prospects in France and Europe from Commercial Agent Griffin, of Lyons, France. The National Millers' association of France, the report says, has just issued an estimate very carefully collected of the probable wheat harvest of France and Europe in 1891. The figures represent all the wheat growing countries of Europe. Generally there will be only an average crop, while in some countries, as in France, the crop will be one-third short.

In conclusion the report says that not only France, but all Europe, is looking longingly to the wheat fields of the United States. Last year many hoped that South America would help supply the deficit, especially the Argentine Republic, but today no mention is made of these countries. All hope is built upon the United States harvest. The fact, as recently stated, is that the supply for Europe must come from America.

Road Work.

This from the New York World is applicable to Oregon road work: The department of agriculture since its creation has done its best to justify its existence, and its publications on minor matters of farming have unquestionably been of value. It might perform a substantial service by giving some attention to the subject of road making in the country. At this time of the year the farmers of New York State are beginning the process known as "working the roads," which to the uninitiated seems to be nothing less than making them impassable for the present with no prospect of ultimate improvement. The custom is kept up, we believe, purely from inherited tradition. It would be a big feather in the cap of Jeremiah, the prophet, if he were to offer a few practical ideas on the subject of road improvement, something to make possible freer trade between the sections of this State.

The Ohio democratic convention resolves in favor of "a reinstatement of the constitutional standard of gold and silver with equal rights for each to free and unlimited coinage." This is the prelude to the 1892 contest, when from every present indication the national democracy will take the same stand. The south and the west are a unit on the question, and the votes on the silver bill in the last congress cannot but commit the party to the policy which the mass of the party indorse.

The natural outlet of the upper Willamette valley is through the Siuslaw river. It is to be hoped that the visit of Senator Mitchell will result in an order compelling the engineers having the work in charge to proceed at once. The Senator when interested leaves nothing undone to accomplish his purposes. His sympathies have been enlisted in the behalf of the Siuslaw and we believe he will prod up the apathetic engineers.

Blaine is chameleon like in the changes that are attributed in his health by zealous correspondents, who are determined to furnish news about the distinguished secretary of state. One correspondent will have him on the verge of the grave while another will represent him as almost recovered, and able to wrestle with diplomatic questions.

The denizens of Eugene are beginning to seek the mountains and sea coast. The stages to the Springs and Florence are crowded on every trip.

Abundant crops are assured. We feel assured that Lane county will have a prosperous fall. At present times and trade are somewhat dull, but that is the usual condition at this time of the year.

Superintendent Downing has made his quarterly report. During the quarter the expenditures were \$9,470.24; earnings, \$7,413.27; receipts, \$688.85; number of convicts at the close of the quarter, 391, being an increase since January of 33. The receipts were greater by \$2500 than during the previous quarter. Of convicts, 30 are sick or decrepit, 43 unemployed and 224 employed in the Northwest foundry at 40 cents a day.
