Leader, July 11

His neck was broken and he was instantly killed. He leaves a widow who is in New York city.

Saw Mill Burned.

COVALLIS, Or., July 11.—Fire broke out at eleven o'clock last night in the large sawmill of Max Frendly. The mill and machinery together with a large amount of seasoned lumber were entirely destroyed. Total loss about twelve thousand dollars, with insurance of five thousand.

SEATTLE, Wash., July 11.—The steamer, Henry Bailey, which started here today from Mount Vernon, Wash., brings the first news of a disastrous fire which occurred yesterday morning at the Hotel. The hotel was nearly consumed with fifteen other business buildings, and two residences, causing a total loss of forty thousand dollars.

The fire was caused by an explosion of a lamp in one of the upper rooms of the hotel, which contained nearly one hundred guests at the time, many of whom escaped with difficulty. Many lost their clothing. For a while a panic reigned. No fatalities occurred however.

DWELLING BURNED.
