An Earnest Appeal.

The Board of Trade of Eugene, Lane County, Oregon, fully understanding the vital importance to the development of th vast material resources of this portion of Oregon, that depends upon the prompt penditure of the amount appropriated by congress for the commencement of work upon the Siuslaw harbor, most respectfully urge that said work shall be begun in obec ience to the expressed will of the people as appears in the act of their duly chosen representatives in making the appropriation The most thoroughly competent business men and mechanics familiar with the cost of the material necessary for the mencement of operations, most respectfully object to the extravagant estimates submit ted to the department by Capt. Symons, of the Board of Examiners charged with the duty of formulating a plan for the works with the probable cost in detail.

The business men of Western Oregon feel that a great injustice may result from the report if uncontradicted in some of its most glaring errors.

First -- The engineers made no soundings whatever, upon which to base their repor-

Without further priation implies. comment, or any disposition to impugn the motives actuating the engineers in making their report, the Eugene Board of Trade most earnestly urge the government, through the Oregon delegation in Congress, to begin the work that our resources may be developed and the commerce of the country lieved from the chief barrier to its speedy increase to vast and important proportions.
