A DELAY—A large wood pile was set on fire, just this side of Walker's station, either by a passing train or tramps, Sunday afternoon, burning out the ties in the railroad track for quite a distance, and warping the iron rails. When the afternoon local reached that point the employees had a lively time fighting the fire, using two flat cars, one of which was used to haul water for the purpose. The train succeeded in getting across the break at 7 p. m.

WE FIND the following in the Baker City Democrat, concerning an old student of the State University: "Hon. Turner Oliver, county clerk of Union county, was in the city Sunday. Mr. Oliver is among the available timber for the office of secretary of state, with a strong record in his long legislative career. He is a sensible and capable man."

BOUND OVER, Baker City Democrat, July 29th. Dr. J. O. Mott was yesterday arraigned in Justice St. Ben's court on a charge of practicing medicine without a license. The justice read the complaint and asked the defendant if his true name was Mr. Mott. The reply was, "Dr. Mott, if you please." The defendant then made a statement before the court, saying that while he had violated the law as charged in the complaint he was not intending to do so, as he was ignorant of the requirement of the law. He further stated that when he arrived in the city he sent it forth with the county clerk's office and filed his diploma as required by law. That he had sent his diploma to the state board of examiners and expected his certificate every day. He informed the court that he had been in the city for the purpose of practicing his profession, and that his intention was unchanged. The court placed the defendant's bond at \$200 to await the action of the next grand jury.

THE RECEIPTS of gold at the government assay office at Roseburg for a single day, recently amounted to \$10,000, of which \$7,500 was the output of Rose county and \$2,500 that of Eastern Oregon.

THE INMATES of the county jail made an attempt to pick the lock of the front door of the "lock-up" Monday afternoon, about 6 o'clock. Deputy Sheriff Croner came upon them suddenly and they left the wire they were using in the lock, where he found it.

THE MACHINERY for the ice plant has been hauled to its location on North street. The machine will be manufactured in about one month.

HARRISBURG COURIER, July 30: Miss Coleman, of Coburg, who is to take charge of the primary department of our school next term, is in town this week.

RECORDER DORRIS has posted notices of the ordered construction of several sidewalks. On Willamette street new walks are ordered between Fisher & Watkins' butcher shop and Beck with's corner, and from the Titus block to 10th street.

THIS IS from the San Francisco Bulletin, and is good advice to Oregon people also: "Now is the time to be extra careful about fire. The country is as dry as tinder. Two villages have been almost burnt up within a day or two, and minor losses are reported from various parts of the state. Fires and forests are in a condition to ignite with half a chance, and are burning in many places. The number of campers in various localities is the danger."

CAPT. SYMONS has made a report to his chief at Washington, in which he lauds the resources and advantages of Coos bay. We make the following extract: "At present the rich valleys of the Coquille, the Umpqua, the Siuslaw, the Rogue, and the Umpqua Willamette have no market for their products and transportation for their exports except by the long railroad lines to Portland and San Francisco. This waste of Southern Oregon wants, and badly needs, a good seaport in its immediate vicinity, readily reached by short lines of railroad. Coos bay is the port towards which all eyes are turned, and on which the people of Southern Oregon base their hopes."

SHERIFF'S SALE—Sheriff J. E. Nolan Sat. afternoon sold the property belonging to John Smith, described as follows: Lot 7, in block 7, in Scott's addition to Eugene, to Sidney Horn, for the sum of \$737.

DEPOT CONTRACT LET—The Oregonian Railway Company has let to W. H. Fenner the contract for a handsome two-story passenger and freight depot at Springfield. The contract price is \$2,950.

GROSS RENT—Judge M. L. Pipes, of Corvallis, left for the East Saturday. Attorneys desiring orders made can apply to any of the other district judges.

DIVORCE CASES DECIDED.

Judge Pipes July 31st filed his decisions in the following cases: Louise Russell vs. T. L. Russell; suit for divorce. Ordered that the bonds of matrimony be dissolved. That plaintiff have charge of the children during their minority. Ordered that the plaintiff have judgment for her costs. Also that the defendant have the privilege of visiting said children at reasonable times.

Maggie McMurry vs. M. W. McMurry, et al; suit for divorce and property. Ordered that the bonds of matrimony between the party be dissolved, and that plaintiff have charge of children during their minority; ordered that plaintiff recover from defendant \$1,500 for the care and education of minor children, and the further sum of \$1,000 for her own maintenance; and for her costs and disbursements; and the executor of H. L. Clucketer are ordered and decreed to pay the above sum to the clerk within 30 days from this date.

DIED—Hannah Krewson Gardner was born at Mount Pleasant, Jefferson county, Ohio, Nov. 21, 1821, and died at her home in Drain, Douglas county, Oregon, on the evening of July 23, 1881. She was converted and joined the M. E. Church at the age of sixteen, was united in marriage with her now deceased husband, I. M. Gardner, on the 24th of December, 1840, and removed to Fallsburg, Licking county, Ohio; from thence to Lee county, Ill., in 1845, and came to Oregon in 1853, settling in the Siuslaw valley, in Lane county.

Stewart's grounds adjoining Eugene. BUILDING DYNAMOMES—At the Eugene foundry work is being vigorously prosecuted on the construction of two dynamoes. One of the dynamoes will be used by Mr. Frazer for giving light to the foundry. Clyde Patterson will employ the other to propel a 20 foot skiff. They will be of one horse power each. The one used in the foundry will furnish eight lights. Clyde mastered the art of winding the armatures with wire during his term at Terre Haute last winter.

NEW CHURCH—We are informed says the Albany Herald that the Cumberland Presbyterian have asked for a site in Sodaville to build a church house and college, both of which will be donated. It is understood that Rev. Blair, of Eugene, will soon return to Sodaville to complete their arrangements, preparatory to building this season. A well conducted college at such a health resort will not lack for patronage. The only wonder is that such an institution was not built years ago.

COW IN PENNS—When Recorder Dorris awoke Sat. morning he found his barn door open and his horse and cow gone. After a search he found the horse near the Eugene bridge, but the cow was nowhere to be seen. He came up to town at the accustomed hour and found his cow had been arrested and placed in the pound by Marshal E. Toland. Our grateful recorder paid the regulation price and escorted her home.

185 ASSESSMENTS—P. J. McPherson has returned from a six week's assessment trip to the Lower Siuslaw. He says that portions of Lane county has improved wonderfully during the past two years. From the head of tide to the ocean he took 185 assessments, while two years ago there were not more than thirty.

DIED—Near Dallas, Oregon, July 28, 1891, Mrs. L. F. Mason, of consumption, aged 28 years. The lady was the wife of Dr. Mason, and was well known in Eugene and Lane county.

RECALLED—The Siuslaw and Eastern Railway Company has recalled the force of surveys from the field. They have finished the work to Tilden rock 45 miles west of Eugene.

BORN—At Heppner, Oregon, July 25, 1891, to the wife of Billy Taylor, a daughter. Mr. Taylor and wife were former residents of our town.

PLANS DRAWN—Frank Brown is drawing plans for an addition to Johnny Zummer's residence on Fifth street. When it is completed it will be a handsome building.
