A Petition From Prisoners.

The inmates of the Lane county jail have addressed the following communication to the Commissioners Court: EUGENE, Oregon, Sept. 8th, 1901.

To the County Commissioners of Lane County, Oregon:

Dear Sirs: We desire to call your especial attention to the following state of facts, and hope your honorable body will take official notice thereof and make a personal investigation forthwith: We are prisoners of Lane county and have been confined in the Lane county jail for two months past, awaiting trial, and will be confined for some two months more before court meets and we can be arranged. Our health has been jeopardized and we are at present sick and have had to have the services of a physician; and the following state of facts are the cause of it:

1. We are compelled to drink water from a well which stands in a cesspool, in the rear of the jail.
2. There is a public privy within ten feet of said well.
3. The mouth of the pump on the inside of the jail stands within fourteen inches of the privy hole on the inside of said jail.
4. There is not proper ventilation in the tanks in which we sleep.
5. By the settling of the building large cracks are left in the floor, which are filled with filth and vermin.
6. It is well known to your honorable body that said jail has been officially condemned for the past three years more by each and every grand jury, as unfit for human beings.
7. We are human beings and respectfully ask that you forthwith provide for the Sheriff of Lane county, a safe, secure and healthy place for our confinement until our trial.
8. We desire to draw your especial attention to section 8, page 759, general laws of Oregon.
9. We desire to say to you that we are treated first-class by the Sheriff and his deputies, and are given plenty to eat—have no fault to find with them—and refer you to them as to truthfulness on any statements made in this petition. We earnestly pray that as an act of humanity and Christianity your honorable body will take action upon this petition forthwith.

Early Journalism.

A. Nolter, at the Press Association, delivered an address on pioneer journalism in this State. He had the following in reference to early Eugene papers:

The Eugene Journal was started by some of the citizens of Eugene, the leading spirit of the enterprise being B. J. Pengra, Esq., with Prof. Rogers as its editor. My friend, W. M. Taylor, now living in Oakland, Cal., came up from San Francisco and set up the press and for a while in connection with Joel Ware, of Eugene, did the mechanical work on the paper. This was the first press south of Corvallis and north of Jacksonville. The paper has since passed through the hands of the Gale Brothers and has been for many years the property of H. R. Kincaid. The Eugene Herald was started by Alexander Blakely, but it was generally known that it was the enterprise of Col. W. W. Chapman, who was then Surveyor General of Oregon, and was the editor of the paper. It was ably edited and regarded as one of the leading organs of the state. It afterwards passed into the hands of a man named Avery, who suspended its publication. Sometime after this, the material of the Herald was purchased by myself, and in the spring of 1862 started the Democratic Register. I associated with me later on H. C. Miller, better known as "Joaquin Miller," the poet, and we continued the paper until the order came for our suppression. This order, like others, I assure you was the result of our extreme loyalty to the powers that were. After a suspension of two weeks, the name of the paper was changed to Review, and continued under that name for several years. Mr. Miller retired from the paper, and in the fall of 1865 I removed the Review to Salem.

Florence Notes.

The West, Sept. 11.

Engineer Lyell has office room in the Hurd building just east of the drug store.

The government steamer Gen. Wright is here for a week or two making a survey of our river and bar.

Real estate is being given away over in Glenada since G. H. Colter, the father of that town site, has become papa to a blooming baby.

Last Monday morning the Florence salmon cannery was started and is now running day and night. The principal work up until yesterday was that of making cases. There are eighteen Chinamen at work in the cannery, and yesterday they put up two hundred and ninety-five cans of salmon. Eighty-six fish is the biggest one-night-catch yet made and that was by John Mason. Every thing about the cannery is in fine shape.

Civil Engineer G. A. Lyell arrived in Florence last Saturday and is now at work formulating plans and arranging all details preparatory to commencement of work on the bar. Before coming to Florence, Mr. Lyell purchased much of the machinery needed to complete the work. The scows and pile-driver will be built on the river and will be commenced at once. The wharf for the south jetty will be built as soon as possible and as soon as the right of way can be secured at Cannery Hill the buildings—such as blacksmith shop, mess house, office and bunk house will be built.

The Lillian was down at the mouth of the river Tuesday with Mr. Lyell, taking observation of a quite prominent rock reef projecting into the river just north of the south channel.

UNFORTUNATE.

PORTLAND, Or., Sept. 10.—In the case of Mrs. P. J. Coburn against the Portland & Willamette Valley Railway Company to recover \$5000 damages for killing her husband, Abner K. Coburn. The jury this morning brought in a verdict for thirty-five hundred dollars for plaintiff.

Articles have been filed incorporating the United Brethren Church of Eugene. The church has purchased a piece of residence property on Ferry street, between 11th and 12th, and will at once make arrangements for the building of a church edifice on the lot, retitling the present residence for a parsonage. Possession will be given by the 15th inst. Rev. Olds, who has been here about one month, is the pastor of the congregation.

Some hoodlum broke into the house occupied by squaws near the Eugene cannery last night and beat one of the squaws about the head and face. No clue to the identity of the perpetrator.

Pronounced Insane.

Hon. B. J. Pengra was brought here September the 10th from Springfield and examined on the charge of being insane before Judge Scott. Prosecuting Attorney Condon and Medical Examiner Dr. Kurkendall and McCormack. After hearing Mr. Pengra's defense for an hour or two the physicians were thoroughly convinced of his insanity upon his own testimony, and signed the necessary papers committing him to the asylum at Salem. His mania seems to consist of building railroads, making inventions, and on religion.

He was taken to the asylum on the local train by Sheriff J. E. Noland and George Harrison, his son-in-law. Much to the surprise of all, he made no attempt to prevent the carrying out of the object.

Mr. Pengra is an old pioneer, 69 years of age, and has been a prominent man of the state and especially of Lane county. He served for a term of four years as surveyor-general, and for many years was a leader of his party in this portion of Oregon. By and through his instrumentality, principally, the Oregon Mill and Lumber Co. was built, and today he still retains the road bed, a distance of 468 miles. For years he has labored and fought for the development of the enterprising little town of Springfield, and much of its success has been due to his labors. The people universally deplore the losing of the old gentleman's mind at the summit of his life.

STREET CAR TALK.

Extensions May be Made to Fairmount and the West Boundary of Eugene.

We are informed that arrangements are in progress by which the street car line will be extended to Fairmount. It would leave the present line at B street, which adjoins the university grounds on the west, thence to Third street, thence east across the Thibault-McMurry land to a point in Fairmount opposite the oak grove. If the scheme is carried out a park will be laid off at the grove and buildings for a pleasure resort constructed in time for use next spring.

Parties are negotiating with Mr. Holden for the extension of the line to the west boundary of the city in the vicinity of Second street. If these extensions are realized all of the Eugene suburban property will be within reach of the business part of the city.
