Home to the Mines.

Today's Oregon City Enterprise has the  
following: "S. R. and H. C. Green arrived home  
Sunday from the Blue river gold mines  
where they went on the Fourth of July.  
Their party completed the work in hand—  
the driving of a tunnel 100 feet into a ledge.  
A most promising prospect was found.  
There is no doubt in the minds of the  
prospectors that they possess a valuable  
property in their Blue river claim. They  
have a true fissure vein that is rich in gold.  
It is comparatively easy to work, too. Be-  
fore leaving the claim the boys had an offer  
of \$3500 for it but that sum has one crip-  
ple too few to tempt them. Unless they sell  
very soon they purpose putting in ma-  
chinery and working the mine for what  
there is in it. A specimen of the product  
of the mine brought down by Steve Green  
showed fine gold in abundance. J. H.  
Fetter was left in charge of the mine.  
Two or three of the boys continued pro-  
specting in the country on their own hook.  
The claim owned by the Oregon City com-  
pany is 750x1500 feet. Eugene parties are  
greatly interested in the development of that  
mining district and are doing what they  
can to promote the work."

Not Correct.

Daily Guard, August 5.

Yesterday's Oregonian contains the  
following item: "The banks of Eu-  
gene are now refusing to take county  
warrants even at a discount on account  
of the scarcity of money and no pros-  
pects of the county being able to cash  
them for at least two years. This is a  
sad state of affairs, says the Junction  
Times, as many people are obliged to  
cash their warrants and are unable to  
hold them until they can be paid."

The above is not correct. The war-  
rants of the county are eagerly pur-  
chased at from 3 to 5 per cent discount.  
Again, most of the warrants outstanding  
will be cashed in twelve months when  
this discount is not excessive when it  
is considered that the county war-  
rants draw only 8 per cent interest  
while the regular rate is 10 per cent.
