Grover Cleveland.

Portland Telegram: The most-talked-of and admired man in the wide world today is Grover Cleveland. His friends and followers, numbered in the many millions, are rejoicing with good cheer; while his opponents are only such politically, and in their own minds honestly admire this typical American and friend of the people.

His election followed by the largest majority ever given any candidate for governor in any state in the Union. As governor he was ever the guardian of New York's best interests, and gave the state a splendid administration. As president he was the servant of the people, opposed to class legislation, and always endeavored to accomplish the greatest good to the greatest number. As president again he will give the United States a wise and honest administration.

Special to GUARDIAN. PORTLAND, Nov. 10, 4 p. m.—The Legislatures in California and Wisconsin are democratic.

Cleveland carried twenty-six states, Harrison 15, Weaver 5.

Cleveland has 300 electoral votes, Harrison 112, Weaver 32. Caminetti and Geary, congressmen, elected in California.

The people's party receives 25,000 votes in the state of Washington.

The addition of Ohio to the Cleveland column makes the largest electoral vote ever given a presidential candidate. Majority largest except the Grant and Wilson vote.

San Francisco gave Cleveland 8000 plurality.

The Nebraska legislature is composed of 35 democrats, 45 republicans and 15 peoples.
