The murdered man found in the box car at Portland the other day has positively been identified as R. L. Johnson, of Colfax. It is supposed that Johnson entered the car at Colfax to eject tramps and was murdered and hanged by them.

A 100-gallon tank has been purchased by a Long Creek merchant in which to store sufficient coal oil to supply northern Grant county during the winter months when it will be impossible to get freight from the railroad.

Erna Meeker, of the Puyallup, had three-fourths of an acre planted to onions this year, the yield of which was 171,519 pounds, or a growth of at least 60 tons to the acre.
