Baker City Democrat: As a prosecu-

The attention of the custom authorities

has again been called to the smuggling

of contraband Chinamen into the state

of Washington across the Colville reser-

vation. Chinamen, after reaching this side from

the Chinamen across British line, are distrib-

uted in places and persons along the Col-

umbia and gradually work their way to the

center of the state. The custom authori-

ties have known for a long time that the

Colville Indians make plenty of money by

smuggling contraband Chinamen across

their reservation and this is why the In-

dians are jealous of intruders.
