On Wednesday morning the coach arrived with one passenger. He was badly frozen and delirious from suffering. Climbing on the seat they found him frozen stiff and held to the arm of the coach by a mass of ice. The reins were held in his frozen hands as in a vice and had to be cut in pieces.

The horses' mouths were torn by the freezing to the bit.

DEEP SNOW.—Linn County Lumberman: The trip from Green Basin to Detroit would at the present time coming under the head of carrying mail under difficulties. Last Saturday P. M. Roe came down with Uncle Sam's pouches and started back the same day, making six miles and stopping over night with Joseph Hamilton. Sunday he resumed his journey, covering only two miles, when he stopped with Mr. McRay. The snow at that place is 3½ feet deep, while it is four feet at Detroit. It is not known how he made the remainder of the trip. No mail arrived Tuesday from that place.

Two City Governments.—The new city charter of Cottage Grove has become a law, the governor merely filing the same and allowing it to become a law without his signature.
