FROM SALEM. The Legislature Passing Bills at a Rapid Rate. Special to THE GUARD. SALEM, Or., Feb. 15, 3 p. m.—HOUSE.

Senate bill appropriating \$25,000 to the state agricultural college, passed. Bill introduced by Upton, granting females free subsistence, lodging and books at state agricultural college, second reading.

Reports of special committees: On state institutions; adopted. On asylums; favorable. On locks; adverse. The committee investigating the asylum management has completely exonerated the officers.

Senate bill appropriating \$24,000 for normal school at Weston; passed. Bill to create Blaine county, reconsidered and passed, republicans and populists voting aye.

Gullison's bill to enable counties to build armories, passed. King's joint resolution amending the constitution so as to give owners of all arid lands the right to condemn land for purpose of irrigation; passed.

House returns to third reading of house bills. Gullison's militia bill. Northrup for relief of all indigent soldiers. A big fight is being made against the passage of the Portland free bridge bill.
