It is now unlawful for any person without malice to kindle any fire in any field, pasture, enclosure, forest, prairie, or timber land not his own, without the consent of the owners. If any fire so started shall spread and do damage to any buildings, fences, crops, cordwood or timber the party who started the fire will be subject to pay a fine. This law prevents hunters and fishermen from kindling fires in the forests and mountains and its enforcement will be a boon to the owners of timber land in the mountains. As the bill had an emergency clause it is now in effect.
