Overton, the painter, has placed a neat sign in front of his place of business on 8th street. The residence of Harvey Wallace, at Lebanon, was burned yesterday afternoon. Loss, \$800. Portland cast 1420 votes at the school election yesterday. Hon. R. Williams was elected director. Albany elected L. Flinn for director yesterday. Only 115 votes were cast, compare that with Eugene's 726. County Clerk Walker yesterday afternoon granted a marriage license to H. M. Sawyer and Sadie Compton. Joseph C. Perry, a well known citizen of Prineville, died in that city, last week from pneumonia, aged 25 years. The state miller's association held a meeting in Portland yesterday. J. C. Long, of Cottage Grove, was in attendance. W. S. Kellogg, of Canby, is missing and it is feared he has been murdered. He had about \$400 in his pocket when he started for Independence, Feb. 24th, since which time nothing has been heard from him. Springfield Messenger: Geo. A. Dorris, the enterprising Eugene attorney, is having a nice orchard planted on his farm just south of Springfield. George believes in becoming conversant with the virtues of black soil, as well as the virtues of Blackstone. Frank Leonard, who has been lying in the county jail for the past week, on the charge of having unlawfully entered Mrs. Mays' house in Long Tom precinct, was discharged from custody, this morning, the grand jury having found "not a true bill." Oregon City Enterprise: The electric cars have been running into Oregon City for three weeks now and not a runaway has occurred except one which was the fault of the owner of the team who left it standing on the street unattended. There is no danger of runaways if teams are properly handled and hitched. According to a new law which goes into effect on May 21st, the county courts of the several counties of the state will hereafter be required to make a levy, at the same time they levy other taxes, of a tax upon all taxable property in their counties, for school purposes. The levy is to be made upon the per capita as shown by the last preceding school census. The tax thus levied is to be collected in the same manner, at the same time and by the same officers that other taxes are collected. Springfield Messenger: Thaddeus Grubbs, formerly in the drug business at Springfield, but now living on his farm in Mohawk precinct, came near dying of heart disease at the home of his sister, Mrs. J. W. McEwen, in Fairmount, Friday morning. He went out to the barn about 6 o'clock to feed his horses and on returning to the house, fainted away. His wife and sister restored him only to see him become unconscious again. The doctor was summoned and succeeded in bringing him back to life. Astoria Budget: Under change of the Portland city charter the next mayor of that city will be a regular Pac-Bab. He is to have a salary of \$3000 per year, and will have control of the police, fire, and in fact all commissions but the water commission, but no doubt would control that if the gentlemen connected with it were not principally bankers and millionaires. He has more power than the governor of the state. But it will be a good joke on the "ring" if the citizens would stand in together and elect some good nonpartisan to fill the position. JONES OF NEVADA.

Thinks All the People Want is Plenty of Money. NEW YORK, March 14.—Senator John P. Jones, who is at the Grand hotel, says that he does not expect to see harmony exist during the next year between the administration and the senate regarding the financial question. He said: The treasury department and the United States senate do not agree on the gold and silver questions, and I look for friction. I am not familiar with Mr. Cleveland's financial policy but I do not think that he is specially pleased because the senate finance committee has a majority in favor of silver. The committee is in favor of silver, and after carefully looking over the ground I do not think the next congress will pass the Sherman repeal bill. The gold scare we had recently was a newly manufactured article; it was of a kind I never heard of before. Heretofore all financial scares have been brought about when money was scarce, and the panic did some harm. The recent gold scare was shouted about and forced upon the people when money could be had in abundance, and no harm was done. There was no occasion for a scare. One kind of money is as good as another to the American people so long as we are not on a single basis. If we come to a gold standard, of course, we shall need more gold, but it would not cause much relief to issue a few bonds. All we want is plenty of money to carry on business and pay good wages and we have that money in silver.

Nonpartisans Win in the City.

OAKLAND, Cal., March 14.—City electors returns show an overwhelming victory for the Nonpartisan ticket. The total vote was nearly 9,000, and the majority of Parlee for mayor is over 700. The nonpartisans re-elected Auditor Snow and Treasurer Gilpin, and elected 9 of the 11 councilmen, a majority in the board of education, and also in the library board. The vote for mayor stood: Parlee, Nonpartisan, 2881; Davis, pop., 2288; Fitzgerald, dem., 2187; Barker, rep., 969. It was the largest vote ever polled at a city election, and the count was not concluded in some of the precincts until 4 o'clock this morning. Prices of Coal Reduced. Will Build a Lodgeroom.

UNION, Or., March 4.—Articles were filed with the county clerk yesterday afternoon incorporating the Pythian Building association of Union. The incorporators are: Joseph Wright, M. F. The new company proposes to issue stock to build a two-story brick building for the Knights of Pythias lodge of this city, the first story to be rented for store rooms and the upper story for lodge purposes. The building will be erected this spring. Steering Committee's Report. WASHINGTON, March 14.—Democratic senators in caucus today adopted the report of the committee assigning committee chairmanships and the majority representation on committees. The matter of reorganizing the executive offices was discussed, but no action was taken pending the report of the committee. Licensing of Dram Shops. JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., March 14.—The house has passed the senate bill for the appointment by the governor of an excise commission, to have absolute control of the issuance of dram shop licenses by a strict party vote. It takes the licensing power out of the hands of the republican collector at St. Louis. Governor Stone will approve the bill. Oscar Wilde, sent to the penitentiary from this county for larceny, has been granted his sentence having expired.

Legislators Bribed.

Governor McConnell, of Idaho, has addressed a letter to the district attorney in Boise City, in which he says: "The second session of the legislature adjourned on the 6th inst. During the session and since, it has been a notorious fact that parties were here in the interest of different colleges and schemes, and were willing to, and undoubtedly did, use money in purchasing votes to carry out their particular legislation. Neither of the three political parties represented in the recent legislature are blameable for the action of their members in receiving bribes. I do not think that bribery was confined to any one or even two of the parties. I believe that members in all three were influenced in a corrupt manner, and justice to the state demands that prosecutions should be begun, and that the people of this state may know that an individual who so far forgets his duty as to receive a bribe will be obnoxious not only now, but for all time. The state board will furnish information which will probably place you in position where you can obtain such evidence as will lead to the arrest and punishment of offenders both inside and outside the legislature."
