COMPELLING STOCK TO EAT FOOD.

Plank and Wire Fences With Good Posts Will Lessen the Trouble Between Neighb rs.

One of the most frequent causes of marrels between neighbors are the line e ces. The expense entailed on this count, says the Prairie Farmer, to say n thing of the warry and troup e, is in many cases sufficient to have put up a stock proof fence for both parties, and on account of a difference to tween them both will put up and maintain a separate fence with a "devide la e" between bem. Certain'y such a course cannot cannot be reached satisfactorily between neighbors it will be far better for both to call in one or more disinterested ne gobors and let them decide what would be

right rather than go to law.

It is, of course, right and just that each owner should put up and maintain his share of the line fences, and that these should be stock-proof. This is hog tight, mule-high and bull-strong. Yet occasionally, even with a really good sence, unruly stock will break through, But it is better to dispose of animals this kind as soon as possible and for each to keep up his portion, and in doing this to work on the plan of the golden rule-to do yourself as you would have

y ur neighbor do. Plank and wire fences with good posts will not only lessen the trouble between neighbors, but will take up less land and afford less room for weeds, briers or peats to thrive, and while it is an item to dispense with all unnecessary fencing it is very important to have what is med Rice-Island, \$4.75@5.00; Japan, \$4.70 good, and especially line fences. The first string beans in market to is year are a ready sa e at 14 per bushel, or more commonly 12 for a marker basket ul. The best variety is traiden Wax, it being product ve, and ne gorden conored pods being always salable. Two or more picatings can be made, and the land cleared in time to plant turnips or late cabbags. After the price gers low, as it does later in the season, it is too bulky a crop to bear long

Dragging After Plowing.

In all cases where the land is plowed in summer a drag or harrow should ow closely after the plow to smooth the surface. Early in spring an excess of oure, in tine, 16@17/gc; Oregon, 1134@ moisture in the soil is common, and then to have rough turrows to dry out the superfluous mo sture more quick y is an advantage. But even then harrowing the furrows down should be done before they get very dry. In summer, where sod especially is plowed under, the heated air under the jurrow often retards fer-mentation, and if the plowed land is left ong without dragging, it may become too dry for seeds to germinate in it. very light rain soaks down better into a smooth surface, because it does not give bulk enough to spread it out, so that it cannot soak inside the hard lumps.

> Work for Rainy Days. It is so often necessary to work over lours in pleasant weather that when a rainy day comes in summer the farmer

may profitably devote it partly to intelectual improvement. He can at least then take time to estimate carefully what needs to be done and plan as to the best way of doing it.
