Money in New York easier. NEW YORK, May 17.—The easy condition of money in the face of continued shipments of gold excites much comment. The low rates on call, 2 1/2 and 3 per cent, are explained by the influx of money from the interior and the strong position of the banks and the reduced requirements for stock speculation. A million and a half more will go tomorrow. It is estimated the Saturday shipments will be from \$1,500,000 to \$3,000,000. Slight exchange is strong because of the belief that the Bank of England will raise the rate of discount tomorrow on an unofficial statement circulated in Wall street today to the effect that the figures of the assets and liabilities of the National Corlidge Company will show an excess of assets of over \$13,500,000.

Depository and Smith. NEW YORK, May 17.—John Peckhardt, the official referee of the Coney Island Athletic Club, today received a dispatch from Coney Island signed by Judge Newton that arrangements had been completed for the meeting between Jack Dempsey and Billy Smith, to take place July 24. The fight were originally matched to fight June 30, but owing to the death of his wife, Smith asked for a postponement for two months. A compromise was finally reached by Smith agreeing to fight on the above date. All the papers have been signed and Dempsey is now on his way East. The fight will be for the welter-weight championship and a purse of \$5000.

Floods at Erie, Pa. ERIE, Pa., May 17.—The rainfall here is one of the heaviest in the history of the city, and Mill creek which runs through Erie, is running wild and overflowing its banks, carrying buildings and bridges into the lake. The firemen have been out all day rescuing families from the flooded sections, and saving property. Sections of the city are flooded in water as three feet deep in the streets, driving people from their homes by the hundreds. The Nickle Plate, the Philadelphia & Erie and the Pittsburg & Lake Erie railways are crippled by damaged bridges. The loss is already very large.

Creswell Resolves.

CRESWELL, Or., May 18, 1902. EDITOR GUARD:—A meeting of the citizens of Creswell was held today to further consider the county seat question. J. L. McDaniel was called to preside. L. J. Scarborough took the floor and reviewed the history and circumstances that have led up to the present state of county affairs. A. S. Fernald read from "The History of Lane County" to show that the county seat has never been legally located.

Creswell's natural advantages were dwelt upon as also the fact that with the generous offer from our citizens the county could not only be cleared of debt, but new and sufficient buildings constructed and a snug sum remain in the treasury. Mr. McDaniel spoke at length of the many other advantages and improvements that would accrue to our place by the expenditure of a little more energy, push and public spiritedness, and remarked that only lack of enterprise will prevent us from securing the county seat. He stated that Creswell's proposition is \$20,000 and the necessary grounds.

C. F. Moore commented on the charge of selfishness by saying that such selfishness is commendable as we have as good right to the choice of location as any place, and such an opponent will not be likely to occur again soon. After several others had had their say, the question of losing the cost of the jail in case of the removal of the county seat to any other locality was raised, and replied to by the statement that a casual observer would easily perceive the county jail for a private residence upon which as much had been expended for ornamentation as for security and comfort.

After some further speech-making the following resolutions were introduced and passed unanimously. WHEREAS, It appears that Lane county has no legally located county seat; and

WHEREAS, We, as tax payers are interested in having the affairs of the county in respect to the county seat, the county debt and the real estate belonging to it, arranged as we may see fit; and

Resolved: That we demand from the next legislature an enabling act, so that the people of Lane county may have an opportunity to locate the county seat by a majority vote, and further be it

Resolved: That we ask the citizens of other parts of the county to co-operate with us in the appointment of committees to investigate the county affairs, and to perfect plans for future action. Adjourned. S. R. MORRIS, Sec'y.

Baited For Catfish and Caught an Owl. A man of unquestioned veracity vouches for the truth of this story: His friend, who lives a few miles in the country, set a line for catfish one day.
