OREGON I. O. O. F. GRAND LODGE.

Regular Sessions—The Reception and Installation of New Members.

Eugene I. O. O. F. Temple Just Dedicated.

Yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock the procession formed at the Odd Fellows' Temple for the parade. The Eugene Cornet band was placed at the head of the column, followed by Spencer Butte Lodge, Winitush Lodge, Springfield Lodge, and the Springfield Band, officers and representatives of the Grand Lodge in succession.

The line of march was south on Williamette street to Eleventh, East to Oak, north to Seventh, west to Willamette, north to Sixth, then crossing to the west side of Willamette and turning into the I. O. O. F. Temple just south of Seventh.

Here the local lodge halted, formed in open order, the supporters formed an arch with their hands and those behind them halted and formed in open order in quick succession to the front of the column, which was over our heads long and off to the west.

Followed by the representatives of the Springfield and Eugene lodges, passed through in succession and passed up stairs to the I. O. O. F. lodge rooms in the third story.

G. W. Kinsey and G. N. Frazer of the local committee acted as marshals during the parade.

Arriving here the dedicatory services were begun. The spectators were so seated as to have an open rectangle in the center of the room where the impressive ceremony was enacted. The principal actors were: Eugene I. O. O. F., Grand Marshal, A. D. Helman of Ashland, Grand Master, J. S. Stewart of Portland, Grand Senior Warden, and the Heralds were: W. W. Chessman of Springfield, William Drury Colburn, J. M. Kinchen, Irving M. Williams, Eugene I. O. O. F.

That part of the ceremony erecting the monument inscribed with the words, "Fidelity," "Friendship," "Love," "Truth," "Faith," "Hope," "Charity," was indeed beautiful. A delegation from the Eugene Choral Union did the singing of these ceremonies which did much to make the occasion more pleasing.

After the regular ritual ceremony was completed Past Master Geo. H. Barnett of Salem, Grand Master of the second district delivered a very able address. His remarks were in substance:
