As to seenery you have the magnificent gorge of the Columbia, the sage-brush flats along the Snake, the wierd bluffs of Eche canyon, the brown plains of Wyoming and Nebraska, the green fields of Iowa and Illinois, with their splendid farm improvements, the park-like pastures and many mansions of blue-grass Kentucky, and Tennessee.

Our first objective point was Frank fort, Kentucky. Here we were wel-comed by our old college friend W. C. ARRESTED.

PHILADELPHIA, June 1 -- In accordance with a circular issued by Secretary Carlisle, United States Commissioner Edmunds issued warrants for the arrest of six Chinese laborers. The warrants were issued under the net of Congress of August 6, 1882, and not under the Geary act. The law of 1882 forbids Chinese to be in this country and vis who are not registered and provided weeks. with certificates. But four of the war-rants were served and the commissiondate. Lee Kee, a laundryman, and Young Wing and Lee Young, cooks, were given a preliminary hearing and bound over in \$500 for a further hear-
