Lane County Bank, announcing its Lane Coupty Bank, announcing its temporary suspension. The firm is composed of Messrs, A. G. Hovey and H. C. Humphrey, both gentlement be-ing known by nearly every eitizen of the county. They have the sympathy of all in their temporary embarrass-ment. We predict that in a short time all obligations will be net and the old all obligations will be met and the old firm will again resume business. The cause of the suspension is the stringency of the money market throughout the United States.
