If, for the encouragement of industry, we allow it to be appropriated, we must take care that other employment be furnished to those excluded from the appropriation. If we do not, the fundamental right to labor on earth returns to the unemplayed. It is not too soon to provide that as few as possible shall be without a little portion of land."

CHICAGO, Aug. 2.—The silver convention resumed its session this morning. Owing to the imadequate rooms used yesterday it was decided to meet at Central Hall, but the agent stool at the door this morning and refused to open it until \$200 per day was guaran-teed. This was done and the delegates flocked in. President Thurman called the convention to order. Ex-Senator Hill of Colorado addressed the convention on the silver question. Argu-ments were chiefly based on statistics tending to show that the adoption of the gold standard in any country was invariably followed by decades of pov-erty and depression. At the conclus-ion of Hill's address, the Hon. J. R. Doolittle of Wisconsin, presented reso-lutions declaring it the duty of con-gress to coin both gold and silver in such ratio of weight that bullion in the silver dollar shall count in yalue bullion. silver dollar shall equal in value bullion in the gold dollar; referred to a committee on resolutions.

The Resolutions.

ICITICAGO, Ill., Aug. 2.—Congress-man F. G. Newland, of Nevada, followed in an address reviewing con-gressional legislation on the silver question. The committee on resolu tions this afternoon submitted a long report. The preamble, after reciting the antiquity of bimetallism. reviews

The preamble further recites that the money of the country is inadequate for the business of the balance level between the debtor and creditor of the various nations, the supply of currentation and business with increase with ey must increase with increased population and business. The resolutions then say: "There must be no compromise of this question. All legislation demonetizing silver or restricting coinage thereof must be immediately and completely repealed by act restor-ing the country to the condition established by the founders of the nation. The resolutions assert that the power of this nation to stand on its own feet, to legislate for itself upon all subjects. The only remedy for purely metallic financial troubles is to open the mints of the nation to gold and silver on equal terms at the old ratio of 16 of silver to 1 of gold.

THE SHERMAN ACT. While the Sherman act is objectionwhite the Sterman act is objectionable, the resolutions protest against repeal of the act except by an act restoring free bimetallic colunge, as it existed prior to 1872. The resolutions assert that the unparalleled calamities which now afflict the American peo-ple are not due to the so-called Sher-man act, and in proof thereof call at-tention to the fact that the same evil conditions now prevail over all the gold standard world. Bad as is the state of affairs in this country, it would have been still worse but for the Sherman act, by which the nation has obtained to some extent an expanding circulation. The resolutions insist on the purchase of the full amount of silver each month.



HINTS TO GROWERS.

Hops Should Be Allowed to Ripen Thor oughly and Then be Well Cured.

LONDON, July 19, 1883. Editor Statesman: —A few words on the above subject will probably inter-est many of your renders. There is no doubt that Oregon hops are fast com-ing to the front on the Landon market. With all due deference to what Mr. Meeker says in a recent circular of his about Oregon heps, I maintain that (with perhaps the exception of some hops grown in Sonoma county, Cal.) they are—when allowed to get ripe before they are picked-the best hope grown on the Pacific const.

grown on the Pacific const.

I had about 5,000 bales of hops from Oregon during the past season, all consigned to me direct from growers, and when our market was dull and there was almost no sale for English and German hops I was selling Oregon hops freely at from 10 shillings to 20 shilling per hundred weight more money than English or German hops were bringing. This fact alone I think speaks for itself about Oregon hops. The flavor of these hops is good. Some of the lots I had were almost equal in flavor to our best East Kents, especially some lots from Hillsboro and Champoeg.

One word about contracting, I would say to the grower, don't contract ahead. Nine times out of ten I think I might almost say 29 times out of a 100), the grower gets the worst of it, and it gives the dealers enough hops to on with, so that they can keep off the market and do all they can to depres prices with the very hops the growe has sold him shead.

Let your hops get ripe before you pick them, one them well, and there will always be a sale for them on the London market. Thos. Usnonne.
