An Important Conference. Washington, Sept. 11.—It is credibly reported that the administration and a majority of congress have de-cided to repeal the prohibitory tax on state banks, with some condition. The preparation of the bill has been en-trusted to Representative Hall, of Missouri, and John DeWitt Warner, of New York. Mr. Springer, the chairman of the committee on banking and currency in the house is oppose to the repeal of the state bank tax, but he will be defeated in the committee. The bill will probably take the form

of the National Government printing the money, numbering it and holding itself responsible for punishment of counterfeiters.

Persons or companies desiring to enter the banking business by state char-ter are to deposit with the state bonds and other securities of known value to be approved by the Comptroller of the state or other fiscal agent thereof, in much the same manner that national banks are made to deposit bonds of the United States with the secretary of the tremury under the national bank When this formula is com plied with the government will be giv-en the authority to revoke the 10 per cent tax and give the bank permission to do business; and the government will use this issue in the payment of customs due, international revenue and other governmental debts, thus giv-ing the currency a national standing

The president of 57 national banks in the state of Massachusetts, most of the presidents of national banks in York City and the presidents of all the national banks in Chicago, with the exception of two, have peti-tioned for the repeal of the 19 per cent tax on state banks and have intimated that when the tax is repealed under proper qualifications they would sur-render their charters as national banks morning. and engage in business under the state

It was the first time that a president has been in one of the executive departments for a long time.
