#### Ancient and Modern English Guns.

Nelson's ship, the Victory, was designed to carry 104 gans, consisting of 32, 24 and 12 pounders, ranged on her upper, main, middle and lower decks, She was also armed with a few 68-pounder carronades. The weight of her one broadside of single shotted guns was 1,104 pounds, which was considered prodigious in those days.
