When an early crop has matured, have another ready to take its place. Dusting white hellebore over the foliage will stop the currant worm.

The best way in fighting insect pests is done when they first make their appearance. It is a safe rule not to expect or allow a tree to bear more fruit than its branches will sustain.

In fighting the curculion on the plum the trees should be jarred daily in order to make thorough work.

It is a safe rule not to expect or allow a tree to bear more fruit than its branches will sustain. For the colling moth on the apples spray as soon as the fruit has set, using a pound of paris green to 100 gallons of water.

It is possible to mature too much while the tree is growing, but after it comes into bearing manure can be applied without stint.

A good rule with a young orchard is to keep in with some cultivated or hood crop during the first five years after planting, manuring thoroughly meanwhile, and then seed down to clover.
