FRESNO, Cal., Dec. 25.—The escape of Chris Evans from the Fresno county jail last night is still the sensation of the hour. Sheriff Scott, who was in the south assisting in running down the Roscoe robbers was telegraphed about the escape when he started for home, arriving here at 2:40 this morning.

A report comes from Sanger that Evans was seen early this morning going up the King's River Lumber Company's flume and heading for his old quarters at Sampson's flat. While it is believed to be Evans' destination the rumor is discredited.
