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LOW STATE TAX LEVY.

The Salem Journal explains the reason of the present low levy made by the state board for state taxes.

The economy with which these several public institutions were managed enabled the board to levy actually less than the appropriation made by the last legislature.

The state officers made no further levy for the year for current expenses. It was also estimated that there would be a saving in the expenses of these institutions during 1894.

The board expects to go forward with all state institutions as fast as the payment of taxes will justify, the present policy not to run the state in debt.
