

The Oregonian Will Not Publish the Truth in Reference to Multnomah's Assessment.

To THE EDITOR:—The truth to which you refer in your issue of the 27th inst., is not the truth in reference to Multnomah's assessment.

I want a statement to the Editor of the Daily Oregonian and he refused to publish it. The reason, he states, is that "it is the product of ignorance and impudence."

The assessment on business lots and improvements in Multnomah for the year 1893 is \$2,370,000, or that an assessment of \$77,000 on the Perkins hotel and ground, which is worth at least \$250,000, ought to be reduced 25 per cent.

In the New Year's edition of the Oregonian published January 2, 1893, appears this statement: New buildings for 1891-2. \$13,797,965

It can be seen from the above that the value of improvements put on lots in Portland for the years 1891 and 1892, was worth, January 1, 1893, \$13,797,965.
